County Court Sittings
The June sittings of the County Court and General Sessions of the Peace opened on Tuesday, the 14th inst., His Honour Judge Hopkins presiding. There were two non-jury actions entered for trial, viz:
McCloy vs. Gilbertson—An action brought by a landlord against his tenant for damages for cutting down trees and pulling down a woodshed on the premises leased. Both parties reside in the township of Oneida, Arrell and Arrell for plaintiff, S. E. Lindsay for defendant. The plaintiff was awarded damages of \$90 with Division Court costs, and no set off.
Houser vs. Humfries—Action for damages arising out of an automobile collision, the plaintiff claiming that the collision arose out of the negligence of the defendant in not keeping the proper side of the road. The accident happened near Winger in the township of Wainfleet. The plaintiff resides in Dunnville, and the defendant in the township of Seneca. Walter T. Robb for the plaintiff. Arrell & Arrell for defendant. This case was laid over.
There being no criminal business for the Court, the members of the jury panels were notified not to attend.
A man named Lewis, who was up some time ago, was let off on suspended sentence.
A. E. Hull, an Indian, was given three months, for the theft of a bicycle.

JARVIS WINS ANOTHER
Defeated Cayuga last Thursday 9 to 4.

Jarvis defeated Cayuga here last Thursday for the second time this season in a Haldimand League fixture by 9 to 4. By winning this game Jarvis is again tied for second place in the league race with Rainham Centre, that team dropping one to Caledonia the same day. Cayuga started off like a winner, the first three batters hitting safely, but were retired with only one run. Another was added in the 4th period and two more in the 9th. Jarvis was blanked in the first two innings but came strong in the third, scoring five runs on four hits aided by a couple of errors. In this innings Inson hit the first home run of the season on the local grounds, driving in two runs ahead of him, and winning a box of cigars offered by Wm. Hodges.
