How to Kill A Minister

Criticize his sermons. Say 'he is too old fashioned', 'too closely confined to his notes', 'he is too liberal in his theology', 'his sermons are too long', 'he is stupid, tiresome, monotonous.' Be sure never to tell him that his sermon helped you, that might make him puffed up.
Complain because he does not call as often as you think he might. Forget that he has half a hundred other families to call on, has two sermons at least to prepare each week, must marry the living and bury the dead and must on all occasions be all things to all men that he may win some.
Criticize his family, especially his wife. Say 'she takes up too much of his time', 'She tries to run the Church', 'She is not in sympathy with his work', 'She has too many hats', 'She dresses too well' or 'not well enough.'

Go to some other church, because you do not like the minister you have, or because the other minister is more sensational, more orthodox or heterodox, more socially inclined, more educated, more anything else that suits your fancy.
Always look out for your minister's weakest point. Never appreciate his strong qualities. To do that would be to be convinced that with all his failings he has consecrated himself to his high calling of God for your salvation, that he has probably sacrificed a large part of his life for a more living wage than the rest of men may be saved and come to a knowledge of the truth.
There is nothing else needed.

MR. HASTINGS DISMISSED
Attorney-General Appoints Another Man in Dunnville Magistrate's Place
Although J. A. Patterson, K.C., whom Hon. W. E. Raney sent over to Cayuga to investigate the administration of Police Magistrate David Hastings, brought in a report that on the whole was a tribute rather than a condemnation that Mr. Hastings be asked to resign, the Attorney-General has dismissed the magistrate from office. Mr. Raney has accomplished his purpose, not by a formal dismissal, but by the simple expedient of appointing someone else in Mr. Hastings' place.

Yesterday the Attorney-General announced the appointment of Lt.-Col. J. C. Massey, police magistrate for the town of Port Colborne and the village of Humberstone, to take office "in the room and stead" of David Hastings, now police magistrate under suspension. Col. Massey is given an extended jurisdiction that covers other territory from that in which Magistrate Hastings had authority, including as it does the townships of Wainfleet and Humberstone, the village of Crystal Beach, also the County of Haldimand. The town of Dunnville and the townships of Canboro, Mouton, Dunn, South Cayuga and Sherbrooke in Haldimand represented Magistrate Hastings' district.
