Jarvis Has Decided to Have
One For Next Winter.

There was a good attendance of citizens
at the Park meeting last Friday night
to discuss park improvements and to con-
sider the erection of a skating rink.
Mr. I. W. Holmes was chosen as chair-
man and Mr. E. T. Carter as secretary of
the meeting. Wm. Hodges reported that
he had examined a rink building that
could be bought and recommended its
purchase. It was decided to purchase
the building and Messrs. W. Hodges,
D. C. Allen and E. T. Carter were ap-
pointed a committee to secure an option
on building until the necessary funds can
be raised. Messrs. C. Underhill, C. S.
McCarter and Andy Miller were named
as canvassers in the village, and Doc
Parkinson, Carl Smith and Oril William-
son in the country. Mr. Brown, of the
Bank of Hamilton, was appointed as
treasurer of the fund. Messrs. C. Brock,
W. A. Owen and W. Hodges were ap-
pointed members of the Park planning
committee. Since the meeting a move
is on foot to form a joint stock company
which is meeting with considerable favor.
Which ever plan is adopted should receive
the hearty support of not only the citizens
but the people of the whole community,
so that we may be assured of a rink next
