**Why Kaiser Is Safe**

**W**HY has William of Hohenzollern not been brought to trial? There are three reasons. The first is that under existing laws he committed no crime; there was no competent court to try him if he had, and Holland refused to surrender him. There may be other reasons, but these are deemed sufficient. The case was explained in a recent address delivered in Philadelphia by Dr. James Brown Scott, an American authority on international law, and attached to the American Peace Commission as a technical adviser. He believes that it would have been outrageous and unwise to try the Kaiser, and that in time to come the world will be grateful to Holland for refusing to surrender him, and to the delegates at Paris who strongly opposed his indictment. The United States and Japan were from the beginning absolutely set against bringing the arch criminal to book. In fact, we gathered from Dr. Scott that the case for William could not have been better argued if it had been entrusted to German professors on law.

The Commission on Responsibilities had no difficulty in finding that Germany and her associates planned the war, and frustrated the efforts of Allied statesmen to avert it. The question to decide was whether the former Kaiser had committed a crime when Germany violated her treaty obligations. It was reluctantly decided that in point of law he did not commit a crime, but that from the point of view of morality he undoubtedly did. Therefore he was arraigned "for a supreme offence against international morality and the sanctity of treaties." His offence therefore was political. The original draft prepared by the commission is said to have declared specifically that the offence was not criminal, but at the suggestion of Lloyd George this phrase was omitted. It was agreed that William could not be tried for a violation of the laws and customs of war, for according to international and national law a sovereign or chief executive of a state is exempt, except at the hands of his own countrymen. The former emperor could legally be tried in Germany, but could not be tried anywhere else under the laws as they exist to-day. It is odd to find the American delegation particularly insistent upon the immunity granted by customs to monarchs.

So it was for a supreme offence against international morality and the sanctity of treaties that the Allies asked Holland to surrender the fugitive for trial. It was then divulged that not one of the Allied powers had an extradition treaty with Holland which provided for the surrender of political refugees, and since the charge was political it followed that Holland was without legal rights in refusing the surrender. Holland knew, moreover, that both Japan and the United States hoped the prisoner would not be surrendered, and may have suspected that some of the other powers who made the demand would be saved some embarrassment if it were refused. Britain and France were the most insistent in their demands, which Holland declined to accede to. The wording of the request seemed to admit that legally the Kaiser was entitled to remain in Holland, for the Allies said that it was their duty to press the matter "without arguments, because it is not a question of a public accusation with judicial character as regards its basis, but an act of high international policy imposed by the universal conscience, in which legal forms have been provided solely to assure to the accused such guarantees as were never before recognized in international law." The Dutch Government replied that it was not a party to the Treaty of Versailles, and therefore was not in duty bound to carry out any of its decisions or make good any of its promises. It took its stand by the body of international law as it existed prior to the alleged offences of the accused, and since it was tacitly admitted that no crime, in a legal sense, has been committed by the Kaiser, it declined to give him up.

Thus frustrated, and fearing, because of the attitude of the United States and Japan, to apply pressure which might cause Holland to yield, the Allies were forced to complain that the alleged fugitive was not properly guarded, that he was permitted to dwell too near the German frontier and that if he escaped Holland would be forced to accept a heavy responsibility. Holland reported that the Kaiser was being guarded and would be suitably looked after in the future. Then the Allies practically abandoned the matter, and so William remains in Holland with a fine prospect of dying there. Dr. Scott thinks that if he had been tried into a hero and the way paved for a return of the Hohenzollern dynasty in the person of William's grandson.

In Iowa it gets pretty cold at times, but when the thermometer gets so low that the natives are complaining of the cold, Mrs. James Reed, of Zeeland, Ia., wishes for some real weather. She does not think it is cold until the thermometer reaches 20 or 30 degrees below zero. The explanation of this is that she is a full-blooded Eskimo. She was married to James Reed while he was on a prospecting expedition, and when she was employed as an interpreter to the Friends' Mission at Kotzebue. They moved to the United States so that their five children might have the advantages offered there in the matter of religion.
