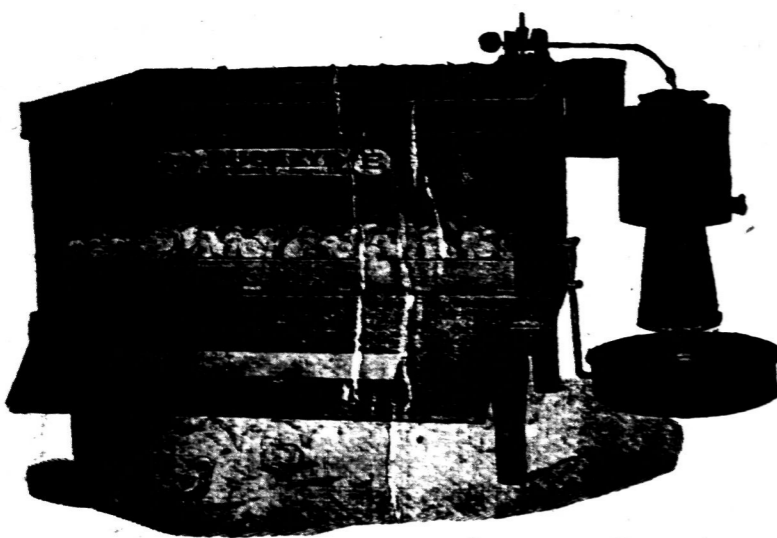

Oil Discovery

Midfield Gas Company Made Announcement Recently

The discovery and location of a petroleum oil pool in North Cayuga township was announced a few days ago by the Midfield Natural Gas company, which holds a lease on the land, situated near Nelles Corners.

The search for oil by this company dates back a number of years, but the largest discovery is the result of a fresh start made in 1920, when seven wells were drilled on the western portion of the property. Distinct indications of the probable trend of gas and oil, were found in three, and the oil pool was finally located in the centre of the three.

The company plans to proceed immediately to develop the oil, which it states, is undoubtedly there in quantity. Railroad shipping facilities are available within half a mile of the wells.

Garfield Brothers Sentenced

Woodstock, March 11.—Norman Jerome Garfield, who last evening was found guilty of murder on the night of January 20 of Bernard Johnston, a local confectioner, was this afternoon sentenced by Justice Kelly to be hanged in the local jailyard on Thursday, June 2. His younger brother, Denton Garfield, found guilty of manslaughter for his part in the killing, was sentenced to 20 years in Kingston penitentiary.

Mrs. Kendall, wife of Percy B. Kendall, chief of the Simcoe fire brigade, died Monday following an illness of less than two days, of meningitis. Deceased, who was in her 64th year, was a daughter of the late Alex. McQueen, of Simcoe. Bruce McQueen, of Port Dover, Alex. McQueen, of Lowell, Mich., are brothers, and one sister, Miss Essie, lives in Simcoe.
