DOMINION WOOL MARKET REPORT.

The general tone of the wool market is very dull. There is very little demand and thus little movement in stocks. Sheep raisers who have been holding wool are now negotiating for co-operative sale. 1,000,000 lbs of graded wool sold since January 1st of this year have averaged 20c per pound, as against an average of 33c for sales made during 1920.
