Creamery Fined \$10 and Costs

Last Friday morning Lea Marshall, manager of the Black Creek Creamery, was haled into court before Magistrate Gunton, charged by Dominion License Inspector of Dairy Products L. O. Tubman with selling butter containing over 16% moisture contrary to section 6 of the Dairy Act.

Marshall stated to the court that he thinks the provincial inspector tested that particular churning, and found it to be exactly 16 per cent. When the Dominion Inspector tested the butter in Hamilton a few days later his test proved 17 per cent; later still the Dominion analyst at Ottawa reported the third test to be 17 1/3 per cent.

Owing to the differences in the tests and in view of the fact that it looked like a technical error, Squire Gunton fined Marshall ten dollars and costs.—Simcoe Reformer.

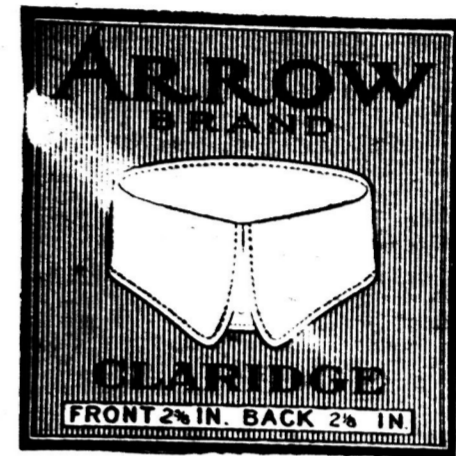
