Letter From Nanticoke

To the Editor of the "Jarvis Record."

Dear Mr. Editor,

As may be known to many of your readers the oldest resident of Nanticoke in the person of William Dwyer, recently passed away having entered upon his 91st year. Poor, aged, and feeble, but not to be despised because of these things, he has passed from our midst, and to myself and others also it seemed incongruous, and altogether out of place, that on the night following his decease, a noisy dance should be held in the Public Hall in close proximity to the home of the deceased and kept up until 3 o'clock in the morning, a very distressing and disturbing thing for the mourning household. Are we losing all sense of propriety and due regard for the feelings of others in these days? Was it because the deceased happened to be poor, and, perhaps, in the estimation of some of title account, that a dance was allowed to proceed which one feels certain could have been, and, if death had called away a wealthier resident, would have been, at least, postponed, especially when local. It is to one's mind most regrettable that there should be such apparent lack of concern, or respect, for the feelings of our fellows as shown in such happenings when with a little tact, and use of common sense, and also the application of the principles of respect and decency it might be avoided and no harm done either to the would-be dancers. To advance the plea that in larger places these things are not postponed, except in rare instances, in case of death, is hardly germane to the subject matter here dealt with. Where postponement, to say the least, is possible without serious inconvenience to any concerned, then, surely as a matter of courtesy, respect, and honor any right-thinking person would acquiesce in a decision to postpone. Personally, one fails to see in such proceedings as those referred to any reasonable ground for even a pardonable excuse, however others may view it.
