Among the students of the Canada Business College, Hamilton, Kenneth Saunders and Bruce McKenzie were successful in their final examinations in the commercial course.

Mrs. Marshall Roberts, who has been taking treatment at the Mount Hamilton Hospital for several weeks, has returned home, and, we are pleased to state, much improved in health.

Alfred Love, a returned soldier, who has been ill for some time, died at Caledonia on Thursday last. A very large military funeral was held on Sunday, the body being laid to rest in Unity burying ground.

The new Park grounds are beginning to assume a more level appearance. The farmers in the vicinity have turned out with their teams during the past week and others have lent their services in the work of preparing the grounds. There is considerable work to be done yet, but when completed the town will have a splendid park.

Mr. MacConnell, of MacConnell & Hicklin, road contractors, was in town on Monday. Mac says they are now at work on the Provincial highway between Cayuga and Dunnville and will build that portion of the highway this summer. They have also commenced the cement work on culverts and intend doing that portion of the work on the Talbot road from the Norfolk township to Cayuga this year and will build the road next summer.

"There has been no weakening of the new Adolescent Act which requires that after Sept. 1st, next, children must be kept at school until they are 16 years of age," announced by Hon. Mr. Grant, Minister of Education. "But we will be reasonable and enforce it gradually," intimates Mr. Grant. Children who are 15 years of age and who have been working for a year will not be forced back to school.

The Springvale Gas Co. struck a good flow of gas on the farm of Mrs. Solara, about a mile west of Hagersville. The rock pressure exceeds 350 lbs. with a volume of 120,000 cubic feet per day. The citizens of Hagersville are very enthusiastic over the results and see in the effort of the company a solution of their fuel problem. A contract has been made with F. W. Featherstone of Dunnville to drill a number of wells for the company.

Dr. Jacques, census commissioner for Haldimand, has opened the census office in E. H. Hart's building. The enumerators will begin their work on the 1st of June. It is expected that three weeks will be required to complete the work. The census is taken every ten years, and its chief object is to ascertain the exact population of the community. Each person will be required to furnish information in regard to their occupation, their nationality, their age, etc.

Who is to take the place of masons, printers, plumbers and other tradesmen when they retire, is a question that is agitating the public mind in a good many quarters. Apparently the learning of trades by the young men is too slow nowadays, as it takes from four to five years to learn a trade. The young people are now taking up business college courses, or studying for teaching and other professions. The boys who are learning a trade will have something that will always be useful to them and they will be in great demand at high wages as time goes by.

## Instantly Killed

Simcoe, May 14—Mrs. S. H. Harding, wife of the editor of the Port Rowan News, and a most talented woman, came to a sudden death yesterday afternoon while out for an auto ride with Mrs. W. N. Buck and Mrs. O. F. Rockefeller in a car driven by the latter. The car stalled on the hill at Forestville and was backed against the embankment on one side of the road quite skillfully, but unheeding the assurance of Mrs. Rockefeller that there was no danger, the other occupants jumped out of the car as it was backing up.

Mrs. Harding dislocated her neck in the fall and death was instantaneous.

## Road Building in Haldimand

The work of making good roads in Haldimand County commenced for the season of 1921 the last week in April and is being rapidly pushed on by MacConnell & Hicklin, the firm of contractors who did satisfactory work last year. Five large trucks are already employed hauling stone from the quarries of the company at Nelles Corners and also from quarries at Hagersville and Dunnville. Twenty-five miles of road are now under construction, work being carried on at Canfield, Dunnville and Jarvis. The work at Cayuga will begin this week, when the town will be connected with the good road last season, thus making good roads from Cayuga to the east. In the very near future the number of trucks and employees will be greatly increased.

## Waterford's New Fair Grounds

The first car of material for the new agricultural building and rink was unloaded on Monday and the other will be unloaded this week. The main building will be 160 x 60 and have a seating capacity of over 400. Facing the street in front of this building will be the community hall, moderately equipped under the plans approved by the Provincial authorities.

The grounds will have covered sheds for showing live stock, a live stock ring, tennis court, baseball diamond, grand stand and band stand. The lawn in front of the building will be laid out by a landscape gardener from the Ontario Agricultural College.

Waterford will have one of the finest exhibition and recreation grounds of any town the size in Canada. Residents of Townsend and Waterford will be asked for financial assistance and we are sure this call will meet with a hearty response.—Waterford Star.
