## MOTOR FATALITY

### Mrs. Walter Sovereign Died of Injuries

Word was received last Thursday  
morning by Mr. C. W. Yocom that his  
daughter, Mrs. Sovereign, wife of  
Walter Sovereign, publisher of the Lu-  
can Sun, and six-year old daughter,  
Lorna, had met with an automobile ac-  
cident on Wednesday evening about 9  
o'clock. They in company with a neigh-  
bor, Mrs. McIlhenny, aged 60, were  
crossing the street and were struck by  
a motor car. Mrs. Sovereign had three  
ribs broken and her daughter was slight-  
ly injured, while Mrs. McIlhenny sus-  
tained a compound fracture of her hip  
and her condition is considered  
somewhat serious owing to her advan-  
ced age.

Mrs. Sovereign died on Thursday  
afternoon about 4 o'clock. Deceased was  
the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs.  
C. W. Yocom of this village, and is sur-  
vived by her husband and five small  
children. Lorna, the injured one, is  
the youngest. Mr. and Mrs. Yocom and  
daughter, Mrs. Anderson, attended the  
funeral which took place at Lucan on  
Saturday afternoon.

An inquest was opened on Friday  
morning. After viewing the remains  
the Coroner's jury adjourned until this  
Wednesday.

## Sports Postponed

## Census Enumerators

The census enumerators will commence  
their duties on Wednesday next, June  
1st. In all there are 28 enumerators for  
the County of Haldimand, about half of  
whom are returned soldiers, John Dellar  
is the enumerator for Jarvis, and Stanley  
Fields, A. Evans, Bert Williamson and  
Thos. Burton for Walpole. Besides the  
usual personal information the enumer-  
ators will take a record of the agricultural  
production in 1920 and its value, also the  
amount in crop this year. It is suggested  
that farmers and others run over in their  
minds what the production was last year  
so as to be able to answer the questions  
expeditiously and thus save time to them-  
selves and the enumerators. The census  
is to be taken up to May 31. Births or  
deaths after that date are not to be in-  
cluded. In the country one month will  
be allowed for the taking of the census,  
and two weeks for city enumerators.

## County Council

### FOURTH SESSION

Cayuga, May 12, 1921.  
Council met pursuant to adjournment.  
All the members present except Daniel  
Glenny. The Warden in the chair.  
The following communications were  
then read:  
1. Letter from Department of Public  
Highways re County Roads and  
Government Grant. Filed with the  
Clerk.  
2. Notice from Messrs. Shirton and  
Yocom, Justices of the Peace, that Ol-  
ive Newman has been committed to  
the care of the Children's Aid Society,  
filed with the Clerk.  
3. Notice from Messrs. Shirton and  
Yocom, Justices of the Peace, that  
Milton Casper Hofer had been com-  
mitted to the care of the Children's  
Aid Society. Filed with the clerk.  
4. Letter from Dunnville Ministerial  
Association calling the Council's at-  
tention to the fact that a musical in-  
strument, books and desk are required  
to properly conduct services in the  
House of Refuge. Referred to Home  
Committee.

5. Provincial Mothers' Allowance  
Commission, giving list of beneficiaries  
Recommend payment of \$97.50.  
6. C. H. Held & Son, applying for  
permission to install a tank on the  
County Road. Granted, providing they  
furnish a bond of indemnity.  
7. Messrs. Barber, Wynne-Roberts &  
Seymour, applying for reappointment  
as County Engineers. No action taken.  
We recommend that the following  
accounts be paid:  
Grading Ohaweken Creek Bridge  
Roland Angle, 6 hrs at 70c. \$ 4.20  
Chas. Doan, shovelling 6 hrs. 4.20

The report of the Building Com-  
mittee was adopted as follows:  
1. That repairs to the pump and  
water works be made and that David  
Brown's account for \$55.30 be paid.  
2. That Thomas Walsh be empow-  
ered to repair with cement the brick  
wall in the hall of the Court House.  
That the caretaker have the tops of  
the trees in the square hedge cut.

3. That the lease of the house at  
the Court House to Judge Hopkins be  
left to a Committee of the Whole.  
J. A. Tooley, Chairman.

A bylaw was passed for the purpose  
of making a grant of \$5,500 to the  
Village of Hagersville spent on the  
street connecting County road No. 7  
and County road No. 8.

The report of the Home Committee  
was adopted as follows:  
We have met and examined the ac-  
counts for maintenance and find them  
correct, and recommend the same to  
the Finance Committee for payment.  
There is no change in the number of  
inmates since last report.

J. E. Yocom, Chairman.  
The report of the Good Roads Com-  
mittee was adopted as follows:  
1. We have examined the accounts  
presented by the Superintendent and  
recommend the same for payment.  
2. That the Superintendent be au-  
thorized to arrange with MacConnell  
& Hicklin to construct approximately  
1,200 feet of macadamized road 10 ft.  
wide and 8 inches deep when rolled  
and consolidated, commencing at Pro-  
vincial highway No. 4, going north to  
Teet's corner in Camboro Village.

3. That the Clerk be asked to pre-  
pare a bylaw concerning the revised  
allotments of the County Roads.  
4. That the Clerk be authorized to  
prepare a bylaw to make a grant to  
the Village of Hagersville of \$5,500  
for resurfacing King street in said vil-  
lage, connecting County road No. 8,  
with County road No. 7.

5. That the Village of Cayuga be  
paid the sum of \$400, Government  
Grant, for construction work done on  
Talbot Road, and the Village of Caledonia  
be paid the sum of \$3,987.21,  
Government Grant, for construction  
work on streets, connecting County  
road No. 17, and Provincial highway  
No. 5.

That we allow the Canada Ingot Iron  
Co., through their representative Mr.  
Demaray, ship us one road Boss Grad-  
er, freight prepaid, on approval, price  
to be if machine is satisfactory, \$182.

W. G. Clark, Chairman.  
A bylaw was passed for the purpose  
of designating an additional 65% miles  
of county road, and the said 65%  
miles was apportioned according to  
schedule hereto attached.

Extension of road No. 5, known as  
Chesapeake Side Road, from south end  
of present road No. 5, going south to  
Lake Erie 3 miles. No. 19, known as  
the 12th Concession (Mud Street) from  
Provincial Road No. 5, going west to  
Norfolk County line, 5 miles. Exten-  
sion of road, No. 3, known as Spring-  
vale Side Road, commencing at west  
end of present road No. 8, and going  
north to Indian line; thence north-  
westerly along Indian line to 17th  
Concession, 1 1/2 miles. No. 20, known  
as Centre Side Road, commencing at  
Provincial Road No. 5, and going south  
to Sandusky, 4th Concession, 6 miles—  
total 16 1/2 miles.
