Armistice Day

The conclusion of the war is to be celebrated as a public holiday, observed under the name of Armistice Day. A bill to this effect passed its final stage in the House of Commons on Monday. The holiday will be the Monday in the week in which November 11 (the day on which hostilities terminated) occurs and Thanksgiving Day will be held on the same day.

Simcoe District Meeting

The Simcoe district meeting of the Methodist Church was held at Simcoe on Friday. Rev. D. A. Motz, pastor of St. James' Church, presided. Rev. George E. Smith, of Hagersville, was elected to represent the district on the stationing committee with Rev. H. Delar as alternate.

The financial report sent in showed splendid increases in many instances, but only a few changes have been somewhat in deficit as regards the minimum stipend. All of the defaulting cases were recommended for augmentation. Nine rural charges showed slight decreases in membership.

Stations congregation raised for all purposes \$10,114; Hagersville, \$2297; Waterford, \$5,548; Port Dover, \$7,619; Jarvis, \$5,571; Cayuga, \$4,934; and Townsend, \$5,000.
