Hamilton, Ont., Oct. 30. — J. L. Counsell, K. C., made the announcement Saturday that his action on behalf of David Hastings, former police magistrate at Dunnville, against Hon. Mr. Raney, Attorney-General of Ontario, has been postponed. It was to have been heard early in November, but the case has gone over until next court, which will not sit for some months. The action is for slander, etc., in connection with charges of Hon. Mr. Raney against the Dunnville magistrate, which were probed some months ago at a public investigation.

### Haldimand Champions Nearing the Top in the Finals.

The Caledonia team, winners of the Haldimand League and the championship of Western Ontario, surprised themselves and their host of ardent supporters by defeating Picton, Eastern Ontario champions, in the first game of the intermediate O.B.A.A. finals by the one-sided score of 8 to 1 last Thursday. The first two innings Picton team had much the better of the argument although they scored only one run, the visiting hurler striking out the first three men to face him. But things looked altogether different in the third when Caledonia scored five runs on three hits and a base on balls coupled with an error. To make it stronger they added two more in the fifth and one in the seventh. Wright, for Caledonia, steadied down after the second innings and kept the hits well scattered, holding the Eastern champions scoreless for the remainder of the game. Several times they had men on bases when any kind of a hit meant runs, but Wright refused to allow the run-producing wallop. Brown and Todd carried off the batting honors, the former having a homer and a three-bagger to his credit. Croft, the Picton pitcher, had twelve strike outs and Wright six. The score: —
