Mrs. Aiken, widow of the late William
Aiken, passed away on Sunday at the
home of Silas Snyder in this village
after a brief illness, aged 84 years.

Deceased had come on a visit about
three weeks ago while her daughter
with whom she lived in Woodhouse
was moving, shortly afterwards taking
ill, and though given every care and at-
tention it was of no avail.

She leaves three sons, L. F. Aiken,
of Simcoe, Ashton, of Oakville, and
Allen, Butte, Montana; and two daugh-
ters, Mrs. Jones, of Woodhouse, and
Mrs. Cowie, of Sault Ste. Marie. The
funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon
at St. Paul's church, the remains being
laid to rest beside those of her late hus-
band.
