**D. Z. Gibson Chosen as Liberal Candidate**

At a Liberal convention held in Cayuga on Wednesday, Nov. 2, D. Z. Gibson of Oneida was chosen as candidate for Haldimand for the coming election. Among the nominees were Col. A. T. Thompson, B. S. Colter, J. J. Parsons and D. Z. Gibson, the latter getting an unanimous vote. After speeches from R. F. Miller, chairman, and the different nominees, Mr. Tolmie, of Windsor, addressed the meeting. Mr. Gibson is a well-known farmer, residing south of Caledonia. He was defeated by Dr. Jaques, Conservative, for the provincial house in 1914: He is a nephew of Sir John Gibson, a former lieutenant-governor of Ontario.

### Creamery Robbed
