A most successful bazaar was held last Thursday evening by the ladies of the Methodist church. A supper was served in the schoolroom and the proceeds from this and the sale of work, etc., amounted to the handsome sum of \$186. The ladies are to be congratulated upon the success of this event.

The neighbors and relatives of Mr. and Mrs. A. Saunders, Walpole, who invaded their home on the 4th inst., took with them a shower of beautiful and costly presents for the bride and groom which testified to the esteem and respect in which Mr. and Mrs. A. Saunders are held by their many friends.

Mrs. W. W. Frael of Winona, sister of Messrs. Henry and Ben Johnson, has been honored with an invitation extended by the president and trustees of Columbia university, New York city, to witness the ceremony of conferring the degree of doctor of laws on the distinguished leader of the allied armies, Marshal Foch.

Mrs. Mahlon, B. Weidrick, of Naber, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Fearman, of Onondaga township, died in the city hospital, Hamilton, on Tuesday last, following an operation for inward goitre. The funeral was held on Friday afternoon, Nov. 11, from her late home, interment being made in Hagersville cemetery.

Mr. Robert E. Walker, formerly of Caledonia, died at his residence in Toronto on Monday, aged 75 years. He had been for many years a highly respected resident of Caledonia, where he conducted a hardware business. For the past few years he has resided in Toronto. The funeral takes place at Caledonia this (Wednesday) morning.

Truant Officer Lamb had a case tried here on Tuesday before Police Magistrate Massie under the Adolescent Act. The defendant was Mrs. Frederick Cole of Selkirk; the boy who lived with her was 14 years of age and according to the evidence was out of school ten days in September and five days in October. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$10 and costs, \$20.75 in all.

A five acre field of Irish potatoes grown on the farm of J. W. Aggerman, near Delhi, from Government certified seed, yielded 250 bushels to the acre. This patch was awarded first prize in Norfolk county in competition with about 20 other growers. Mr. Aggerman expects to ship his potatoes out as Government tagged certified seed next spring. The first prize in the Norfolk county corn growing competition was taken by John E. Wilson, on the farm adjoining the farm where the potatoes were grown. Pride of Nishnah was the variety on which Mr. Wilson based his hopes in this competition, and it was the county's best. The five acre field yielded some 800 bushels of corn and furnished ensilage to fill a 52-foot silo.

Military Funeral

The funeral of George E. Tyler, formerly of Caledonia, was held in St. John's church, Monroe, Michigan, on Tuesday of last week. The interment took place in St. Joseph's cemetery, Monroe, with full military honors.

Mr. Tyler had lived in both Hamilton and Caledonia and was well known. During the war, he joined the American forces, and went to France with a company of Engineers, seeing service in the Argonne district, and also took part in other battles. During his service overseas, he contracted tuberculosis and died at his home in Detroit on Saturday, after an illness of eighteen months. Surviving are his wife, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Tyler, Caledonia; two sisters, Mrs. W. Dobbin, of Seneca, and Mrs. J. Thompson, of Hamilton; one brother, Sanford Tyler, of Seneca, and an aunt, Miss Tyler, of Hamilton. He was thirty years of age. The funeral was conducted by the American legion.
