The death of Mrs. Joseph Wilson occurred at her home in Hagersville at an early hour on Saturday morning. She ceased to breathe in her usual health up to the evening before her death when she was taken ill and died a few hours later. She was 78 years of age. Two sons and two daughters survive. The funeral took place on Monday afternoon, the service being held at Hagersville and the remains were brought to Jarvis and interred in St. Paul's church cemetery. The services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Douglas of Hagersville.

White Wyandottes On The Way To Germany

Simcoe, Nov. 20.—John S. Martin, of Port Dover, passed through last night en route to New York, to supervise the shipment to Hamburg, Germany, of 25 high-bred White Wyandotte fowl. These birds are to be used to improve the quality of German poultry. This, which is a fairly large sale, is the third of the kind made to Germany, and the second since the war ceased. Payment was made from funds on deposit in the United States.

To Build Two Hotels At Port Dover Resort

Simcoe, Nov. 14.—The Erie Hotel Company has secured a charter to erect two summer hotels in Port Dover at a total expenditure of at least \$100,000, it became known here to-day. The charter gives the new company power to erect and operate hotels, billiard halls, cafeterias, auto parking stations, bowling and tennis grounds and every conceivable sort of pleasure device.

J. W. Cown, of Toronto, the architect, has already taken over the casino with a 132-foot frontage on Walker street and extending back to Clinton street. It is to be laid out in the Japanese style with collapsible walls so that the interior can be changed into large or small suites as desired. The building is to be flanked with Nippon gardens which will extend to the lake shore to be banked in by a concrete wall.

Extension of the United Hotels in capacity to a small lake port is regarded here as one result of the failure to accommodate the hundreds of American tourists that come every year. The closing up of this fall of the Commercial Hotel left the summer resort with but three hotels.

Pieton Appreciates Its Ball Champions

The citizens of Pieton tendered a banquet to the intermediate baseball champions last Friday evening. Gold sashes were presented to the players, and President Hazel of the Pieton A. A. A. was the recipient of a Masonic emblem and a silver pencil. The Spaulding championship trophy, won for the second year in succession, was presented on behalf of the O.B.A.A. by "Jake" Solomon of Peterboro. A cash contribution of \$150 toward the association's deficit was made by the business men of the town.

Woodhouse Farmer Killed

Russell Yeager Loses Life by Being Caught in Belt

A fatal accident occurred late Monday afternoon, about three miles west of this village, when J. Russell Yeager, a Woodhouse township farmer, was almost instantly killed. Mr. Yeager had been operating a corn cutter run by a gasoline engine, and having finished his work threw the belt off the cutter. His foot caught in the belt and he was drawn up to the engine and whirled over and over, breaking both legs and fracturing his skull. The sad affair happened before the eyes of S. Benstead, the hired man, who shut down the engine as quickly as he could, but it was too late. The unfortunate man breathing his last before he could be extricated. The deceased was 39 years of age and is survived by his widow and three children.
