War Souvenir Recovered

Wm. Hunter, teamster, who was arrested one week ago yesterday at Waterford, charged with having in his possession a watch, the property of Thomas Burton of Walpole, knowing it to be stolen, appeared before Magistrate Gunton, Saturday morning at Simcoe.

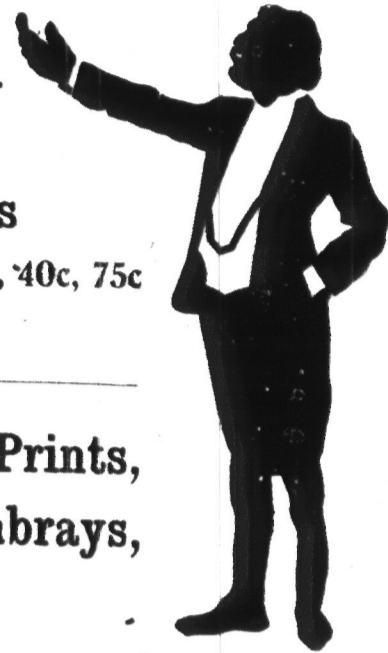
