Induction at Nanticoke
On Tuesday evening, October 18th, the new Rector of All Saints church, the Rev. E. H. Maunsell, M.A., was inducted into his new charge. There was a good attendance. In the absence of His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, the mandate was read and the ceremony performed by the Rev. J. H. Ross, Rural Dean. The Churchwardens proffering the keys of the Church after the accustomed manner. The sermon was preached by the Rev. G. R. Wreford, M.A., Rector of Jarvis. At the close of the service a social gathering took place in the schoolroom to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Maunsell and refreshments were served.

Owing to the increase in the buffalo herd at Wainwright, Alberta, 1,000 of these animals are to be slaughtered. A special building is being erected for the purpose. The buffalo meat will be sent to all points over the country for sale. A strict account is being kept of all heads and skins, which will probably be disposed of by the Canadian Dominion Government. The Wainwright reservation contains the last large herd of Buffalo in the world, with about 3,000 animals.

BETTER THAN EVER
The Jarvis Fair Was Most Successful One.

Saturday proved to be an ideal day for the Jarvis Fair, the weather being all that could be desired, and had the roads been better there would no doubt have been a larger attendance. However there was a good crowd present and the gate receipts were far ahead of any previous year, and the first fair held by the Jarvis Agricultural Society on the new grounds was a most successful one.

The new arena made a grand hall for displaying the exhibits. The upper hall was used for the School Fair exhibits and ladies' fancy work and cooking, while in the lower part the roots and vegetable, etc., were displayed. Never before was there such a large display of fancy work shown at any previous fair held in Jarvis. The Government judge from Toronto stated to the secretary that it was the nicest and best display of fancy work she had judged this fall, and that the cooking was of the very best. One feature was that the prizes were won principally by local exhibitors, the "professional" exhibitor being outclassed.

The Walpole School Fair was also held the same day and the children had an excellent exhibit of school work, etc. Six schools were represented in the parade and drill and each are to be congratulated upon their excellent showing. Mr. Frey, the new agricultural representative, undertook the duties of judge, and awarding as follows:—1st, Room 2, Jarvis, Miss Reid, teacher; 2nd, S.S. No. 11, Chas. Davidson; 3rd, S.S. No. 17, Miss England; 4th, S.S. No. 31, Miss Davidson; 5th, S.S. No. 6, Miss Ward; 6th, Jarvis Primer, Miss Allen. After the judging a number of boys and girls took part in the public speaking contest. We have not learned the prize winners, but expect to give them next week in the list of school fair winners.

There was as usual a good showing of horses and some exceptionally fine ones. In the cattle and sheep classes the showing was very good, but only a few swine.

The soft ball game resulted in Boston winning from Renton, score 10-5.

The Jarvis Band furnished music during the afternoon and helped to enliven the day's proceedings. The concert in the evening was of a very entertaining variety and drew a packed house the door receipts amounting to \$148. This brought to a close one of the most successful fairs ever held in Jarvis.
