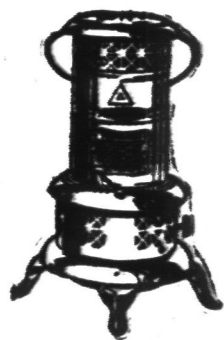

Report adopted as read.

Cayuga, Oct. 13, 1921.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen—Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have examined, carefully, the accounts submitted by the Superintendent, and recommend them for payment.

2. It is estimated that all construction and maintenance work for the season will be completed by October 25.

3. Arrangements are made to have the season's work inspected by the Committee, and an Engineer from the Department on Wednesday and Thursday, October 26 and 27.

4. Communication from Dunnville Consolidated Telephone Co., Ltd., re moving poles on Marshigan Ditch Road, No. 20, be laid over until the November meeting.

5. That the Superintendent be asked to write the Minister of Highways re repairs to Provincial Highway, No. 5.

6. That the next Council meeting be held on Thursday, Nov. 10.

7. That the report of Roger M. Lee re survey of the Mackenzie creek in the vicinity where it crosses the MacKenzie Road, No. 22, be filed in the

Superintendent's Office and submitted to the Good Roads Committee of 1922. (Signed), W. G. Clark, Chairman.

Report adopted as read.

Clark-Wilton—That we recommend the Warden and Treasurer to take up \$15,000 for good roads, and \$15,000 for current expenditures. Carried.

Miles-Gleny—That we do now adjourn to meet on Thursday, November 10, or at the call of the Warden. Carried.

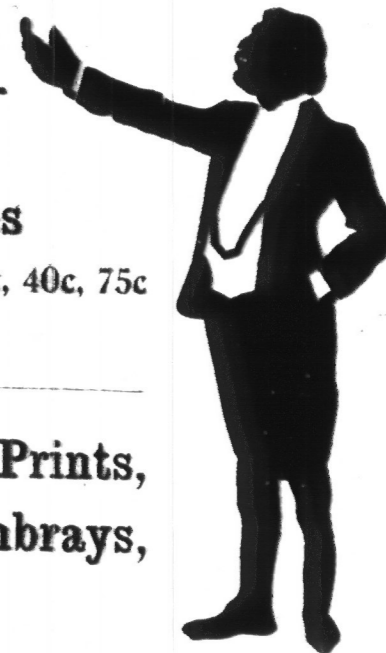
