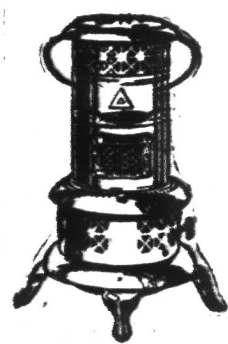

### Haldimand Educational Association

(Continued from page 1.)

On Friday morning the session opened at 9 o'clock with the president in the chair. Miss A. E. Neville of the London Normal School gave the first address on "Clothing." She presented many examples of the work done in class by pupils of different grades. She showed the great value accruing from a knowledge of clothing used in a home, and stated that it was as essential for a boy as for a girl to know the various aspects of the subject of household science.

Miss Pearl Nibbs then gave a very delightful paper on "The Use of Manuals." Through preparation of the subject matter with carefully planned lessons from the Manuals would aid the teacher much to secure success in her work.

Mr. Warren Stringer, M.L.A., gave an address on "Grants." He spoke on the educational work undertaken by the present administration. His address was greatly enjoyed. Agriculture, School Gardens and School Fair work came in for discussion at the close of the address.

Principal Hoag of Hagersville gave an excellent paper on Grammar as taught in his classes. Discussion of this paper was laid over till the afternoon.

Miss McKee of Toronto was then allowed fifteen minutes to demonstrate the use of the Grafonola. The session closed at 12 o'clock.

The afternoon session opened at 1.45 p.m. Miss M. B. Patterson of Caledonia gave a delightful account of the O.E.A. sessions of last Easter as observed by herself.

Miss Neville of London Normal then gave an address on "Food." She spoke of the rural phase of the work of Household Science. The speaker divided the subject under the headings: Food Values, Care of Food, Preparation of Food, Serving of Food, Importing of Food, The Money Value of Foods, produced and manufactured. She closed her exceedingly instructive address by stating the amount of grants given to teachers in schools where Household Science was taught, as well as where a warm lunch was given from Nov. 1st to April 1st.

The subject of Geography was then taken up. Miss M. B. Patterson spoke on Geography as given to second book classes, while Principal Ferguson of Caledonia gave an account of the subject as given by him to the fourth book classes. Both of these teachers' addresses were instructive and intensely interesting, being replete with devices used to make the subject more interesting to pupils. It was moved by Mr. Ferguson, and seconded by Miss B. Martyn, that the above report be adopted.—carried.

Moved by Hoag, seconded by Miss Leuburdt, that a lecture on Primary Education be obtained for the next meeting of the Association.—carried.

The convention closed with the singing of the national anthem.

At the close the members of the Home and School Club of Dunnville very kindly served refreshments. This kindness was very much appreciated by the teachers.

Something that has not previously been done on the program, but that turned out to be one of the most interesting parts of it, was the demonstration by Miss Ethel McKee of Toronto, of the use of the Grafonola in school. She showed how the musical sense of the child could be developed and gave very interesting illustrations of rhythmic penmanship and folk dancing. She aroused the keen interest of those present.
