## County Council

### Eighth Session

Cayuga, Sept. 8, 1921.  
Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present except Dr. R. N. Berry. The Warden in the chair. Wilton-Clark—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read.  
Houser-Doyle—That the minutes be adopted as read. carried.  
The following communications were then read:

1. Letter from George F. Henderson, K.C., Referee under the Natural Gas Act, re-fixing dates for hearing applications.
  2. Letter from Mother's Allowance Commission as to pensions paid and amount required from the County.
  3. Letter from the Indian Office re Nelson bridge.
- Miller-Bradford—That Messrs. J. E. Yocum, J. Toohy and W. Bird be a Committee on Communications. carried.  
Buckley-Houser—That the report of the Printing and Insurance Committee be received and read. carried.

Cayuga, Sept. 8, 1921.  
To the Warden and Members of the County Council:  
Gentlemen—We, your Printing and Insurance Committee, beg leave to report as follows, re-insurance.

We have renewed Police No. 217783 on the pumping plant for \$400, commencing Sept. 16, 1921, to Sept. 16, 1922, with Wm. Hoshal, Cayuga, agent for the Mercantile Fire Insurance Co., the premium being \$6, which we recommend to the Finance Committee for payment. (Signed), C. J. Smelser, Chairman.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:  
Gentlemen—Your Good Roads Committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. The accounts presented by the Superintendent have been checked over carefully and recommend them for payment.
2. That we continue construction work until next meeting.
3. That the Superintendent have plans and specifications prepared for the Gee bridge, and that it be built this season if the Engineer decides there is not sufficient waterway in the old structure to take care of the water.
4. That the Superintendent be authorized to have a base course of gravel placed on the new sub-grade on Road 17, Division 22.
5. That the Superintendent write to the Grand Trunk Railway re-crossing at Nelles' Corners.
6. That we meet again on Thursday, October 13, at 10 a.m. (Signed), W. G. Clark, Chairman.

Bradford-Miller—That we endorse the action of the Warden and Treasurer in taking up \$35,000 for good roads construction. carried.

Miller-Bradford—That we take up the sum of \$30,000 for good roads construction on the credit arranged with the Canadian Bank of Commerce, and the Warden and Treasurer sign a note for the same. carried.

The Council having discussed the question in committee of the whole, it was decided that the Clerk write the Gas Referee, stating that it will be quite satisfied to have the hearing set for the day he hears the application of the Dominion Natural Company.

Council adjourned to meet on Oct. 13, at 10 a.m.
