A Tree for a Tree.

When a forest administrator says that he hopes to see the time when a tree will be planted for every tree cut down on non-agricultural land he does not mean this literally. What he means is that when an acre of forest land is cut over that acre should be planted or seeded at once to bring en another crop. If this is done by planting it will mean that five or six times as many trees will be planted as are cut down, because to induce highgrowth forest trees are planted much closer together than the mature trees stand when cut down. The trees that do not reach maturity are either thinned out and used for ralls or fuel, or die off because the trees that have forged shead have shut off their supply of sunlight.


