They Painted the Town Red

A town where every citizen but one painted his house, made repairs to the premises, fixed up his lawn, and arranged flowers and vegetable gardens was recently described in a press early last summer. The town is Greenfield, Iowa, and the visible results of the Clean-Up and Paint-Up Campaign there are remarkable. Greenfield has 3,000 inhabitants and this propaganda for a more beautiful city was started by a local newspaper, taken up by the Commercial Club and backed by the city officials. Every house in the city with a single exception was repainted. All porches, windows, fences, sidewalks and other things in disrepair were attended to. Then refuse, ashes and other waste were cleaned up. Attention was then turned to lawns and gardens and the result, says Mr. Chase, is one of the neatest and most attractive towns he had ever seen.

The clean-up and paint-up campaign is assuming a continental-wide scope. Jarvis is one of the prettiest towns in Ontario and if our people would join in this progressive movement there would be some to surpass us. Now then all together for a brighter, cleaner and better Jarvis.

All Parties United in Feeding Russian Children

The Save the Children Fund has the active support of the Government and both opposition parties in Parliament and facilities for making the appeal have been generously placed at the disposal of the Committee. It was only necessary to make known the plight of the Russian people to enlist their hearty co-operation. Yet there are many who hold back. They do not fully realize the stern realities of the famine situation. They have never been face to face with the possibility of death starvation. Living in a land of comparative plenty it is difficult for them to grasp the awful consequences of a complete failure of crops in a remote land.

Col. H. J. Mackie who saw Russia in the early winter vouches that the sufferings of the women and children were beyond description. Yet the worst was to come. These people, with the rigors of winter in front of them, were destined to die by millions if food in large quantities was not made immediately available.

Those who have survived are in this terrible plight; that they are too weak from suffering to till their fields and it is probable that this year's crop failure will be as bad as the last. They must be nourished back to health by the help of the outside world and sustained until the blighted provinces are restored to a condition something like normal.

"All Lovely" Says Soviet

In another column an appeal is being made for starving Russia. Read the following taken from the "Financial Post": "While the agents of the various Russian famine funds are painting a dire picture of the starving children under the Soviet regime, an entirely different coloring to the present conditions in Russia is being given by those who would set up a Soviet in Canada. At a recent meeting at the Soo, T. J. Bell, organizer of the "Workers' Party of Canada" told of the wonders of Soviet rule as exemplified in Russia and displayed "pictures of the Russian Revolution which have never been shown in this country, and are of great interest to every worker. The pictures, we are informed by a business man of the Soo who attended the meeting, showed how well cared for are the aged and children in Russia. Thousands of children are shown being cared for and cured of tuberculosis in the sun cure.

In fact "Financial Post" is informed, things were shown to be "rosy with everything lovely." The Soviet agent emphasized the fact that the Soviet had an army of 5,000,000 men. Pictures showed hundreds of young Russian cadets being trained to be expert military officers; the speaker stressed particularly the statement that there were 300,000 of these young cadets. The speaker declared that his purpose was to organize young men's councils of an educational nature, the members to be taught economics, how to run a Soviet, and how to shoot—he repeated the word shoot with force. He said they believed in communism but not yellow socialism. When the Russian army wavered, he observed, the communists rushed in and put things in order; they were the ones to the front everywhere in Russia."

Merchant's Bank \$444

That affairs in the Merchants Bank Head Office branch at Montreal in connection with Thornton Davidson, Executive Ladies Wear and a considerable number of other accounts were "absolutely rotten" as long ago as 1915—and were so reported by him at the time—was alleged by a former inspector of the bank.
