**Give The Grass a Chance**  
The practice of taking sheep out of lawns and lawns is quite common. The time gained by such a practice is not worth considering when balanced against the damage on the grass. It is a little detail which makes or mar the appearance of the place. Give the grass a chance.

**Disease-Free Raspberry Stock**  
Any person wishing to sell red raspberry stock for planting, and desiring to avail themselves of the inspection service of the Division of Botany, Ottawa, should apply for this service before May 1st. If the plantations meet certain requirements, a certificate stating that the stock is practically free from leaf curl, mosaic and other important diseases will be given. All applications should be mailed before May 1st to the Plant Pathologist, Dominion Laboratory, 204 St. Paul Street, St. Catharines, Ont. In making application it is important that the full name, mail address, lot and concession numbers of the applicants be stated.
