Notice to Gas Users.
During the last few weeks numerous applications have been received by Lieut.-Col. R. B. Harkness, Natural Gas Commissioner under the Ontario Government, from localities supplied by natural gas, for permits to use gas as a substitute for coal under boilers and in various other ways on the ground that coal is unobtainable, and also that its present price is prohibitive.

The Commissioner points out that the essence of the law regarding natural gas is to conserve the supply as far as possible, for domestic cooking and heating, and that the same shortage of fuel is, and will be felt by the householders as by the manufacturer. In fact, householders by reason of this shortage, will undoubtedly place more dependence on the natural gas for heating during the coming winter than they did last

Rapid Progress Made

Work on the Provincial Highway advancing rapidly—MacConnell & Hicklin Doing Good Work.

The rapid progress being made on the provincial highway in this neighborhood is very gratifying. The firm of MacConnell & Hicklin has made not only very satisfactory speed in construction, but are making an excellent job. On the part of the road running west towards Simcoe only a small portion remains to be completed, that near Mr. J. J. Parsons', and this will be done this week. By the end of September it is expected that the portion of the road between Jarvis and Nelles Corners will be finished and ready for use. In Norfolk contractor, Mr. McLean, is pushing the work and it is expected that shortly weeks there will be a bus service established by the United Lines, Limited, from Simcoe through to Dunnville thus making Jarvis an important junction point. Mr. Hicklin, of the local contractors, this week supplied the editor of the "Record" with much valuable information regarding the building of the highway, and the amount of material required for the proper construction of the same.

MacConnell & Hicklin's contract for 10 1/2 miles will use over 100,000,000 pounds of stone, as it requires more than 4,500 tons to complete a mile of roadway. The construction is composed of two layers of stone. First a layer of 4-inch stone and screenings are put down and rolled with heavy steam rollers; then the second or finishing layer composed of 2-inch stone and fine screenings and stone dust well watered and rolled down compactly. The two layers when well packed and rolled present a roadway of solid stone seven inches deep and the uniform width of twenty feet. When the portions of the east-west highway are completed there will be an excellent road from Niagara Falls to St. Thomas. It is to be hoped that the Provincial Government will take hold of and push to rapid completion a provincial highway the road from Hamilton to Port Dover, which, if done, would give auto tourists and others a first class road from Toronto to Lake Erie. The time of having the public highways built as they used to do in bygone days is past, for good roads are the first requisites necessary for prosperous districts. The hit-and-miss system of road building as practised by our fathers is en-passe. Permanent roads are an absolute necessity and increase the value of all property they pass through.
