OUTLOOK IS HOPEFUL

Railway Strike in U.S. May End This Week.

Washington Administration Believes That a Compromise Can Be Arranged, Unless President Loe of the Delaware & Hudson Railroad, Leader of the Die-Hards, Blocks It.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—Peace terms have been agreed to in the country-wide railway strike, and formal ratification has been assured through President Harding's efforts.

The way to end the coal strike may be found at conferences which President Lewis of the mine workers and a peacefully inclined faction of the bituminous operators are endeavoring now to arrange.

Loe's stand against compromise on the security issue has won some support among other rail executives and considerable sympathy among large employers all over the country.

SEEK POINCARÉ'S LIFE: Seven German Assassins Plan to Kill the French Premier.

MONEY ALMOST VALUELESS

German Republic Shaken by Collapse of the Mark.

BERLIN, Aug. 1.—French refusal to grant Germany's request for a partial moratorium of reparations sent the mark to the new low level of 625 to the dollar.

Chancellor Wirth, Finance Minister Harnack and State Secretary von Haniel were unable to reach a decision. All three agreed that there is danger of German money dwindling in value to the disappearing point.

Financial chaos followed by collapse of the German republic was feared Monday as the mark tumbled to a new record low on the London exchange, being quoted at 3,000 to the pound.

WILL ARBITRATE DISPUTES: Troubles on Canadian Railways Likely to Be Settled.

OTTAWA, Aug. 1.—The railroad labor situation in Canada was further cleared Monday by appointments to two boards of conciliation authorized to investigate the wage disputes between the Grand Trunk and the Canadian National Railway and the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees and between the Canadian National Railway and the Brotherhood. H. S. Ross, C. G. Montreal, has been selected by the board to handle the conferences on the National Lines, while Geo. D. Kelly, Ottawa, is acting for the company.

MARQUEE IN RAPIDS

Passengers of Steamer Had an Unexpected Thrill.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.—Through the snapping of a rudder chain while the steamer Rapids Prince of the Canada Steamship Lines was in Lachine Rapids at seven o'clock Saturday evening, the vessel was caught by the swift-running current and showed on a rocky ledge, where she now lies. Her bow stern remains in the channel, continuously swept by the great weight of water.

None of the passengers were injured and no one was on board during the night, it being deemed unwise to attempt any rescue operations during the dusk or twilight.
