HE DIED AT HIS WORK

Ireland Loses Great Leader in Arthur Griffith.

Whole Country Shocked by Tragic Death of One of the Leaders of the Sinn Fein Movement — He Favored the Settlement by Which His Country Became a Free State.

DUBLIN, Aug. 15.—The death of Arthur Griffith was tragically sudden. It was generally believed that he was only suffering from a temporary breakdown and would be about again in a few days. His immediate ailment was tonsillitis, for which he was operated upon a few days ago. The operation was successful, and Griffith had recovered from it and was able to spend some time in his office each day attending to the affairs of state. Saturday morning Griffith appeared to be quite well, as prior to leaving for his office just before 10 o'clock he cheerfully bade good-morning to one of the nursing staff. The sister states that he then stooped to tie a shoe lace when he suddenly fell forward in a faint. The sister and other members of the staff were immediately at hand to render him assistance. When Griffith regained consciousness the sister asked him if he had ever been taken ill in that way before, and Griffith said "No." He was immediately placed in bed, a priest and doctor being sent for.

In the meantime he again collapsed and blood was seen issuing from his mouth. Dr. McGuinness, Dr. Meade and Dr. Gogarty rendered all assistance possible, but without success. Griffith passed away within a few minutes, not, however, before Rev. John Lee of the Mariat Fathers' House, a few doors away, had attended and administered the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church. Immediately after the priest had concluded his ministrations Griffith quietly expired.

SEND ONE TO GERMANY

Newfoundland Will Trade With the Late Enemy.

Oldest Colony in the British Empire Has Decided to Get Back to Pre-War Basis With the Teutons—Big Contracts Have Been Made, and Shipments Leave Daily for the Fatherland.

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Iron ore is going out and German money is coming in, in Newfoundland, as before the war, Lord Morris, former Premier of that colony, said at the Hotel Malpique.

Lord Morris has been for some forty years connected with public life of Newfoundland, though he retired formally from politics at the time of his resignation as Premier, in January, 1919. He is at present a member of the executive of the British Empire Exhibition to be held in London in 1924.

He has been in Newfoundland for several weeks in connection with the exhibition, and is in New York for a week on his way back.

To a question as to the restoration of trade with Germany, he said: "The Dominion Iron & Steel Co., who own the iron mines on Bellefleur, Newfoundland, have entered into large contracts with Germany to supply it with the product of these mines. Shipment after shipment is now daily leaving Newfoundland for German ports. Contracts have been made for upwards of 700,000 tons for this season."

"One of the largest pulp and paper mills in the world was established at Grand Falls in 1905 by Lord Northcliffe and his associates," he said. "The paper upon which newspapers and magazines are now printed in London is mostly obtained from the forests of Newfoundland. Spruce is used entirely. They can cut within their concession at the present rate for a hundred years without exhausting their supply, even if the forests did not reproduce themselves; but the spruce forests do not reproduce themselves for pulp purposes in less than twenty years."

"Another large concern, known as the Humber Proprietors, on the Humber river, is now being considered by the owners of the property and by English capitalists and engineers. It is said the water powers on this property, as well as the timber, promises to produce a development quite equal to the finest mills in the world."

Conditions in Newfoundland and in Canada are hopeful, Lord Morris declared. "Canada has turned the corner," he said, "and is meeting with a considerable measure of success in solving the political and fiscal problems resulting from the war."

As to England, he observed: "England is endeavoring to solve not alone her own problems, but the problems of the world."

"Judged by the number of unemployed, there has been a marked improvement in the labor market there during the last three or four months. The number of registered unemployed has fallen from 2,000,000 to 1,400,000."

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Aug. 15.—A party of explorers, including Prof. W. G. Worcester, provincial ceramic engineer, and Prof. C. J. Mackenzie, of the Saskatchewan University, and W. G. Hastings, of the Bureau of Labor, left Saturday for Red Deer Lake, to investigate sources of origin of coal deposits found on the banks of the Red river.

Doctor's Body Found in Canal. OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—The body of Dr. J. C. Greenhouse, 40, who disappeared after attending a loss theatre on the night of Aug. 8, was found floating in the Rideau Canal Saturday by a party of canoeists. Coroner Craig decided that no inquest was necessary.

To Set Farm Hours. LONDON, Eng., Aug. 15.—The Hague International Court of Justice by a majority has decided affirmatively the question submitted by France rising out of the long controversy at the International Labor Conference at Geneva last October as to whether the international labor organization of the League of Nations was competent to regulate internationally the hours and other conditions affecting agricultural workers. The French and Roumanian judges dissented.

The Hague court decided that the labor organization was not competent to scrutinize the means of production.

Artificial Legs. A Danish physician who formerly manufactured artificial legs out of papier mache, now, it is said, makes artificial feet out of paper pulp.

Holders of maturing fully registered bonds, interest payable by cheque from Ottawa, will receive their December 1 interest cheque as usual. Holders of coupon bonds will detach and retain the last unmaturing coupon before surrendering the bond itself for conversion purposes.

The surrendered bonds will be forwarded by banks to the Minister of Finance at Ottawa, where they will be exchanged for bonds of the new issue, in fully registered, or coupon registered or coupon bearer form carrying interest payable 1st May and 1st November of each year of the duration of the loan, the first interest payment accruing and payable 1st May, 1923. Bonds of the new issue will be sent to the banks for delivery immediately after the receipt of the surrendered bonds.

The bonds of the maturing issue which are not converted under this proposal will be paid off in cash on the 1st December, 1922.
