## Cayuga Court House Destroyed

A defective gas pipe is believed to be the cause of the disastrous fire which broke out yesterday morning in the Court House Building, which together with the County Jail, was completely destroyed. The fire was discovered at 3.30, and had a good hold by the time the firefighters arrived on the scene.

Five prisoners held in the jail were rescued by the firemen, who also succeeded by hard work in saving the Judge's residence, which is in close proximity to the destroyed buildings. The court house was a fine stone building, and it is estimated that it cannot be replaced for less than \$300,000. Insurance amounting to \$24,000 was carried. The personal loss to officials at the court house and jail will also be heavy.

The splendid county law library, which Judge Hopkins had been collecting for years, is a total loss. It is valued at \$3,000. The county records were almost all saved, those being on the ground floor, and these were easily accessible. The local branch of the Federal Income Tax Office was in the building, and is also a great loss.
