TYPIFIED SPIRIT OF FRANCE

Elderly peasant woman proud that she had given three sons to her beloved country.

"While I was in France several other boys and I were taking a Sunday afternoon hike and as we approached a little village we overtook a poor peasant woman, whose back was bent with toil and care, whose hair was gray with years of suffering, slowly hobbling along carrying a heavy pair of wooden shoes on her feet and pushing a wheelbarrow loaded with little pieces of wood that she had spent hours in gathering," says the "Flying Parson," Lieut. Belvin W. Maynard, in his article, "The Thrill of High Adventure," in Boys' Life. "One of the boys offered to push the wheelbarrow for her, but she, being so unaccustomed to such favors, looked at him in astonishment as though she thought he wished to steal her wood.

"Soon she was convinced he was friendly and allowed him to push her wheelbarrow for her. The expression of joy and happiness that beamed through the wrinkles of her careworn face I shall never forget. She insisted that we go to her home with her. We did, and there found a humble little stone building, unattractive, unfinished, and with no modern conveniences to add to its comforts. Seated in this cold, damp little hut she told us of real sacrifice. Although its floor was stone, its stove, which was the fireplace, its table, and its beds were all in one room, it was a home, and within its walls had been born and reared three stalwart and brave sons of France, who had given their lives for their country. This poor woman—I thought she must be poor—was happy and proud. Proud that she had given three sons to the cause of France. To her they could not have been born for a more noble cause. She would not have had them die otherwise. Was she poor? Far from it. With such a spirit no one can be poor."
