1. Miss Walker, acknowledging the receipt of condolence.
2. Letter from the County of York, enclosing resolution memorializing the Hon. the Minister of Education to consider the advisability of instituting in the Public Schools of Ontario a simple form of bible study.
3. Counties of Dundas, Stormont and Glengarry, enclosing resolution, asking that prisoners in goal charged with an offence against the Ontario Temperance Act, be classified as Government prisoners instead of County prisoners.
4. County of Perth, asking the government to assume the full cost of construction and maintenance of highways.
5. County of Halton, asking that no property be exempt from taxation.
6. Letter from Dr. Walker and Dr. Riggs, each applying to be appointed physician of the House of Refuge.
7. Good Roads Association, advising of meeting on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd of March.
8. Municipal Association, asking for membership fee of \$25.
9. Copy of resolution from Town of Hespeler, disapproving of raising the examination standards for matriculation to the Universities.
10. National Sanitarium Association, asking for grant.
11. Hospital for Sick Children, asking for grant.
12. A. E. Amos & Co., re sale of Debentures.
13. Miss A. MacInnes and Wm. J. Ridley, re damage by flooding.
14. Mother's Allowance Commission.

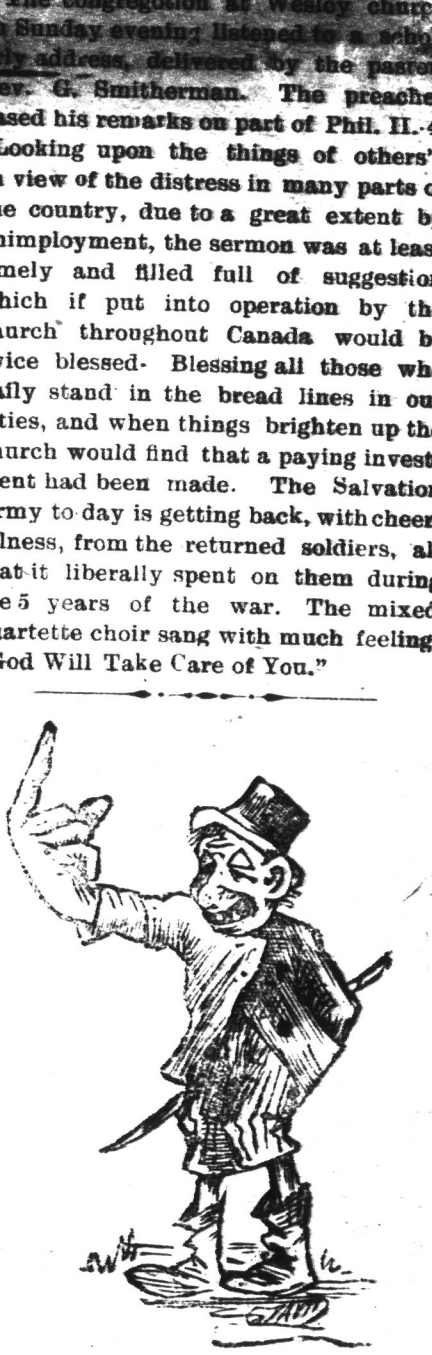
Varenco W. I. Meeting

Presentation To Faithful Church Worker
Mr. Andrew Rodgers Presented With Silver Mounted Cane

At a meeting of the Jarvis Circuit held in the basement of the Garnet Methodist church on Monday afternoon Mr. Andrew Rodgers was presented with a silver mounted cane as a slight token of the regard in which he is held by his fellow workers in the Methodist church.

For over 30 years Mr. Rodgers has held office in the Methodist church and at the present time Recording Steward. He has been connected with the church since the first service held in Jarvis, 61 years ago. In 1848 Mr. Rodgers, with his parents came here from Toronto, and the site upon which the Record office now stands was cleared of bush by his father and a small building put up for the making and repairing of shoes. Mr. Rodgers is, we understand the oldest, continuous, resident in Jarvis. The Record wishes Mr. Rodgers will live long enough to wear the cane one, which, judging from appearances, there is every likelihood of him doing.
