

By-Law No. 61.

Whereas it is expedient and necessary that a by-law be passed for the parking of automobiles on the streets of the Village of Jarvis also limiting the running of the engine wheel and regulating the lights thereof.

Therefore the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis enacts as follows:

- 1st—All persons shall park on the West side of Main Street Northward from Talbot street and on Talbot street on the North side from Main street on and after six o'clock p.m.
- 2nd—No person shall be allowed to put out the lights nor allow the engine to continue running unless in charge of some person of such auto at any time.
- 3rd—Any person offending against any of the provisions of this By-law shall be liable upon conviction thereof, to a fine not exceeding five dollars exclusive of costs, and in default to be levied on his or her chattels, and in default of such goods and chattels to be imprisoned in the common jail for any period not exceeding five days.
- 4th—This by law shall come into force on the passing thereof by the Council.
