Cold Weather Tells On Town Church Attendance

Owing to the unfavorable turn the weather took on Sunday morning, the congregation at the Anglican church, although not small, was not as large as would be reasonably expected. The Rev. G. R. Wreford, M.A., reviewed briefly the growth of the Christian church, showing the great strides made by the handful of Christians who were given the commission to go into all the world and preach the gospel, beginning first at Jerusalem. The tremendous success of the early Christian was due in a great measure to the valuable work of laymen, such as Stephen. The reverend gentlemen thought that, perhaps, too much effort, in the recent past, had been made in making good churchmen in place of good Christians. Christianity not "Churchianity," was required if the church of today was to measure up to the success of the pioneers in the Christian faith.

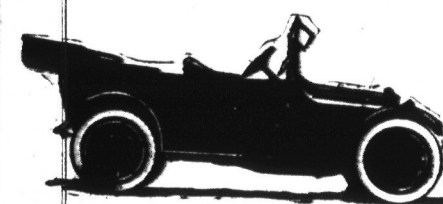
