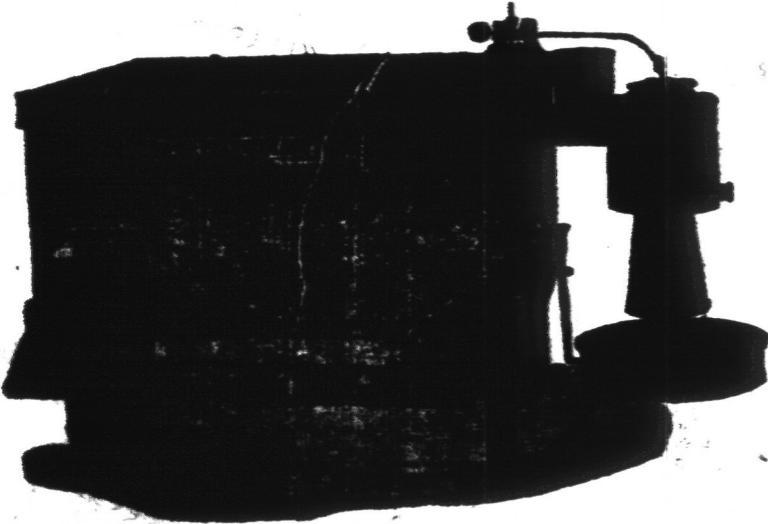

Boys Body Found

On Saturday, February 11th, 1922, Arvine Baxter, the 12-year-old son of Mrs. Baxter, of Cayuga, was drowned in the Grand River at Cayuga. He with a couple of his chums were playing on the ice Arvine happened to strike an air hole and fell through the ice and disappeared before his comrades could do anything to help him. They quickly gave the alarm and every effort was made to recover the body, but for a time without avail. One night at the end of last week a friend of the family had a dream in which he found the exact spot where the body lay and it so impressed him that he procured assistance and proceeded to the spot on the river revealed in his dream. After cutting through about three feet of ice and using a grappling pole recovered the body. Mrs. Baxter is the widow of the late Lieut.-Col. Baxter, who organized the 114th Battalion, C.E.F., but who contracted typhoid fever at Toronto and died in February, 1916. The deceased boy was the youngest of four children and the heartfelt sympathy of all are with Mrs. Baxter in the sad loss that she has sustained.
