**Anniversary at St. Paul's Church**  
The week commencing on January 8th will witness the twenty fifth anniversary of the present church, which was dedicated by Bishop Dumoulin on January 10, 1897, during the incumbency of the Rev. Canon Piper, now Rector of Thorold. Not the least interesting feature of St. Paul's church is the unusual number of memorials to those intimately connected in the past with church life in Jarvis. The stained windows around the church include memorials to Bishop Fuller, the Rev. E. Briggs, T. and E. Piper, Alice Bourne and Elizabeth Jones, William Hewitt and Oliver Ward, Bertha and Ada Morrow, Robert and Margaret Maxwell, John and Jane Rodgers and William and Margaret Lambert.  
The Benedos and Holy Table was given as a memorial to Mr. Aitken, the brass Alms Dish was given by Miss Bourne, and the two massive Chancel chairs are in memory of William Maxwell and Mr. Armour, respectively.  
The Font was given by Rev. Mr. Francis, in memory of an infant son. The installation of the present Pipe organ, a sweet toned and powerful instrument, was rendered possible as a result of a generous legacy bequeathed to the church by the late Canon Belt, to whose memory a handsome bronze tablet adorns the East wall. The result being that St. Paul's is one of the most completely and beautifully appointed of any of the smaller churches in Canada.  
The worshippers of St. Paul's church possess a splendid heritage and it is to be hoped that they will walk in the steps and follow the example of the host of bygone worthies, who were regular attendants in the house of God.

**Teachers Agreement To Mean More**  
Present indications are that the agreements between teachers, when engaged, and the Trustee Boards employing them, will be in the future more effective, and perhaps more satisfactory to all concerned. At a joint meeting of representatives of Trustee Boards, ratepayers and teacher's associations recently held in Toronto a resolution was passed requesting the Minister of Education to amend the Public School, Continuation Schools, and High Schools Act so as to require all teachers to enter into a written agreement with School Boards, to be effective until the close of the school year in June, such agreement to be renewed from year to year unless terminated by either party on September 1 by at least thirty days' notice in writing.
