## Charter Granted

To the Jarvis Creamery and Products Company, Limited.

The Ontario Gazette of Dec. 24 gives notice that letters patent have been issued to the Jarvis Creamery and Products Company Limited, to manufacture condensed and evaporated milk; to sell pure milk and all the products; to raise and deal in cattle, etc., with a capital of \$40,000. The head office is at Jarvis, and the provisional directors are F. L. Snelvey, Charles F. Parkinson, E. G. Mehlbacher, John Wodham and J. J. Parsons.

## Red Bird Busses

The Red Bird Transit Co., who are operating the present motor-bus service from Hamilton to Caledonia, Hagersville, Jarvis, Selkirk, etc., are providing equipment and accommodation for their passengers which undoubtedly places this firm second to none in motor passenger transportation. The new headquarters of the firm, situated in the Royal Templar building, corner Main and Walnut streets, Hamilton, and which will be known as the Red Bird Transit depot, have been opened and all cars will depart from above addresses, instead of the general post-office as was formerly the case. The depot is composed of office of the firm and waiting room for passengers, information bureau; all conveniences, etc., are provided. Two new busses are also going into immediate service, which will provide adequate accommodation for present traffic on this line.

The plans for extending the service to Simcoe and Port Dover next summer are practically completed, and, with the additional equipment ordered to take care of this extension, the year of 1922 promises to see the most complete and systemic service ever rendered the travelling public by motor-busses in this country. The plans also include waiting rooms, etc., at all points along the line of operation. With the complete organization of the above scheme the Red Bird will undoubtedly be a gasoline railroad.

## Cases Dismissed

Magistrate Massie held court in Hagersville on Tuesday, two cases being on the docket, Dr. Jacques, V.S., of Fisherville, and Dr. Everett, V.S., of this town, were charged with 'breaches of the O.T.A. The charges were laid by the Inspector for Haldimand County. After hearing considerable evidence for the prosecution and defense the Magistrate dismissed both cases.
