## The New Nickels

A few of the first Canadian nickels to be struck by the Royal mint, have been received in Hamilton. The new nickel, which is slightly larger than a ten cent piece, and about the size of the new coppers, has on its face the head of the King and inscription, "Georgivs V. Del. gra. rex et Ind. Imp." on the reverse side there is a large figure 5 in the center, the word "Canada" above, two maple leaves beneath, and 1922 at the center bottom. Across the center on each side of the figure 5 are the words "Five" and "cents." The edges of the new coins, which are made of pure Canadian nickel, are perfectly smooth.

## Magistrate Massie Had Busy Year

From the return of Col. J. C. Massie, Police Magistrate, for the year ending 1921, we take the following information.  
Total cases tried..... 534  
Total indictable cases in which convictions made..... 33  
Number of other offences in which convictions made..... 362  
Number of persons committed for trial..... 6  
Total amount of fines imposed \$16,608.50  
Total amount of fines received 12,743.50  
Amount of fines paid to the municipalities..... 3,372.50  
There were 133 cases dismissed. The difference between the amounts of the fines imposed and those received is accounted for by the fact that some defendants took the option and went to jail instead of paying the fine imposed. The above figures cover Col. Massie's whole district—Haldimand and south-west Welland.

## SIX NATIONS WIN ACTION FOR LAND

Judgment Given in Suit to Recover 200 Acres in Brant

End of Long Dispute—Was Started by Action of Governor-General in 1869  
Judgment has been given by the exchequer Court at Ottawa in favor of the crown in the action of the King against the New England Company, to recover possession of 200 acres of land held by the company and used as a farm in connection with the Mohawk Institute at Brantford. The Six Nations Indians, on whose behalf the proceedings were taken against the company, will now be able to have the lands, which are very valuable, sold for the benefit of their people.

The circumstances of the case were rather unusual. The lands formed part of the original grant of some 1,200 square miles, made by the British Government in 1784 to the Six Nations, as some recompense for their losses fighting on the Loyalist side in the Revolutionary War. The New England Company, incorporated in the time of Charles II., has carried on missionary and educational work among the Indians since an early period in the colonial history of America and took up work among the Six Nations of the Grand River about the year 1827. The Indians then consented to a grant to the company of ten acres, on which the buildings in connection with the Mohawk Institute were erected and since maintained. In 1859 the company induced the then governor-general to give them a license to hold some 200 additional acres of land, adjoining the institute, for farming purposes during the maintenance of the institute by the company.  
The Six Nations then and since maintained the governor-general acted without their consent or other authority in giving this license. The company claimed a perpetual right to occupy the lands. Finally the governor decided to have the dispute determined by the courts, with the result the claim of the Six Nations has been established.  
A. G. Chisholm, K.C., of London, and R. V. Sinclair, K.C., of Ottawa, represented the crown, and W. S. Brewster, K.C., of Brantford, the New England Company.
