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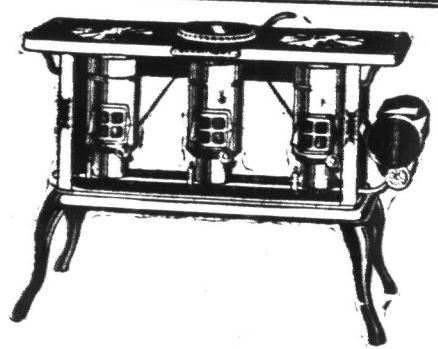

On Sunday morning the subject was—"Seeking the Lost." Zeehosen, the chief publisher, a man of low stature, and of a much dispirited calling, put himself to a great deal of trouble to get a glimpse of Jesus. He was rewarded with the honor of entertaining the Master as his guest.

The self-righteous rulers of the Jews were offended, saying—"This man receiveth sinners and eateth with them." This drew forth from Jesus the great gospel truth, "The Son of Man is come to seek and save that which was lost. By the parables of 'The Lost Sheep,' 'The Woman's Lost Piece of Silver' and 'The Prodigal Son,' Jesus taught God's tireless effort to seek and save the lost.

Portions of the special service for Dominion Day were used. This is found on page 678 of the new revised prayer book.

The evening discourse held up Cornelius, the Roman Centurion, as a pattern to Christians. Though an alien he had embraced many of the tenets of the Jewish faith. He was a devout man, who feared God; was a man of prayer and gave much alms to the people. His prayers and his alms went up as a memorial before God, and St. Peter was sent to receive him into the Christian Society.

This he did by commanding him to be baptized into the name of the Lord. This act proved to the satisfaction of the believers to whom St. Peter related the occurrence, "Then hath God also to the Gentiles granted repentance and life.

The national anthem was sung after the presentation of the arms at evening.
