NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

The Busy Week's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put Into Handy and Attractive Shape for the Readers of Our Paper—A Solid Hour's Enjoyment.

WEDNESDAY.

Reichstag ratifies Rapallo treaty. Battle in Dublin is nearing its end. Big Republican demonstration in Berlin. "Hikers" hold mass meeting at Toronto. Ocean liners talk by 'phone over 500 miles. Four deaths occur in New York celebrations. Anti-Jewish rioting breaks out in Vilna, Poland. Toronto Publicity Bureau is formally launched. Berlin is aflame with red flags; the republic is safe. Dresden won the Fourth of July Handicap at Port Erie. There is talk at Ottawa of a Liberal-Progressive merger. Robbers secure large sum of money from Toronto bakery vault. Canadian railway shop workers to wait Board of Conciliation. Railway maintenance-of-way men in U. S. are not to strike. Benny Leonard won from "Rocky" Kansas in the eighth round. Toronto Irish beat All Scots, 2 to 0, in the Connaught Cup series. Zionist convention at Ottawa concludes with election of officers. Seven men were hit by an engine at Ashbury Park, N.J.; three are dead. A woman was terribly burned at Toronto while using spirit lamp in her home. The Dominion Line freight steamer Orthesa is reported to be sinking at Father Point, Que. Major Blake has arrived at Athens on his round-the-world airplane flight from London, England. Lord Robert Cecil laid before the commission of the League of Nations his plan for disarmament. Chief Loft addressed the Ottawa Rotary Club, asking white Canada to give Indians a helping hand. I. Gilliland, a traveler for a Toronto shoe firm, was killed in an automobile accident in Alberta. The New York-Montreal express was derailed near Childwood, N.Y.; 100 passengers were badly shaken up, but nobody seriously hurt.

THURSDAY.

Australia's revenue exceeds estimates. Syracuse defeated Toronto Wednesday, 3 to 2. Cho Cho won the Lafayette handicap at Port Erie. Roger Hornsby made his 20th homer of the season. Dinner given by British Bar to Chief Justice Tait. Red armies are on Polish and Roumanian frontiers. The widow of Field Marshal Wilson may enter Parliament. De Vries, only important insurgent chief not in prison. Further heavy rains ensure good crop in Southern Alberta. Last rebel stronghold in Dublin surrendered to Free State. League of Nations subcommission approves Cecil's proposals. Canadian National Railway employees discuss wage rates. Dominion Cabinet may get addition but no shake-up is planned. Over 30,000 acres of grain was destroyed by hail in Manitoba. Memory of pioneer missionaries to Ontario honored at Port Dover. Mail bandits in United States arrested after seven months' pursuit. A cow wrecks the Ocean Express near St. Moise, Que.; mail clerk is killed. Hon. Peter Smith defends his financing at gathering of Victoria farmers. Gunman at Belfast is sent to prison and is to be given fifteen strokes of the "cat." Prince Albert of Monaco leaves five million francs to various scientific organizations. Two miners at Sydney, N.S., overcome by black damp while searching for lost boy. Mrs. Mary Rood, 25, was crushed to death by an auto at Windsor when she pushed baby carriage out of danger. Notable gathering at Port Dover does lasting honor to Dolliver and Galline on spot where explorers landed in 1670 and possessed the land in the name of Louis XIV.

FRIDAY.

Historic piles in Dublin are heaps of ruins. Hoover won his heat at the Royal Henley. French chamber votes confidence in Poincare. Ninety-mile gale sweeps over Great Britain. Sinn Fein rebels to wage guerrilla war in Irish hills. Britain is taking no steps to make loan to Germany. Airman burns in plane crash near Mt. Clemens, Mich. Mrs. Edith Gibbs, 49, was killed by train at Hamilton. Fred Scott was drowned at Southampton while bathing. Seances probed by French scientists fail to make good. Powers to refuse to loan money to Russia on Red security. Red delegates to The Hague pawn jewels to pay hotel bills. Kitties gained on St. Louis by winning twice from Cleveland. Mrs. Mallory and Miss Sigourney lost in the double at Wimbledon. The Leafs defeated Syracuse twice. Wingo made his eighteenth homer. Elmira business men are subject to campaign of anonymous threats. Ford Company of Canada has added several hundred acres to its plant. Three hundred and fifty New Yorkers in peril in subway from gas and smoke. Roy Rennie was eliminated from the running for the Ontario tennis championship.

SATURDAY.

Ten thousand bass fry were deposited in East and West Lakes, Prince Edward. Mr. and Mrs. John Woodward, St. Catharines, celebrate their 61st anniversary of their wedding day. With the first half of the schedule nearly completed, Hamilton is three points behind the Saginaw M.O. team. Lady Gage, widow of the founder, laid the corner-stone of the new sanatorium which replaces the building at Gravenhurst destroyed by fire. Peace and quiet again prevail in Dublin. Baron von Scholmer-Lieser of Germany is dead. Japan is in the market for Canadian footwear. Lake City, Kan., was nearly swept away by tornado. Greek fleet is destroying Turk vessels in Black Sea. Life-savers at Toronto save four from water graves. It is stated that Germany is hovering on bankruptcy. The Reds are keeping up policy of bluff at The Hague. Hamilton lost to Brantford, 8 to 3, in the M.O. League. Newspapers at Windsor are pressing for stronger beer. Rogers Hornsby made his 21st home run of the season. George Connor was run over by a 12-ton truck at Toronto. The total net debt of Canada on June 30 was \$2,397,411,815. New York Giants defeated Pittsburgh in the eighteenth innings. Vatican has placed a ban on all the works of Anatole France. Rabbi Halpern of Jewish Synagogue, Toronto, dies suddenly. A manacled man at Bridgeburg leads into Niagara, but is rescued. Hoover is in the final of the Diamond Seuls with Beresford, England. The Province of Quebec will provide radium for treatment of disease. Montreal bandits got away with \$29,000 from Dominion Textile Co. Forest fires in British Columbia sweep woods and wipe out settlements. The body of a woman, minus the head, was found in Niagara river, below the falls. C. W. Inksater, Niagara, won the singles at the Ontario Bowling Association tournament.

SUNDAY.

Visitor to Rentrev is found dead in lake. Egypt seeks power over the Suez Canal. Big oil interests in evidence at The Hague. Wheat is being cut in North Oxford. Minister Schanzer meets Poincare in Paris. Persian bandits forms new Asian Republic. The Leafs beat Buffalo on Sunday, 6 to 4. Sterling at Toronto, \$4.60 1/2; New York, \$4.44 1/2. Young Port Burwell man is drowned at Port Stanley. Walter Hoover, U. S. carman, won the Diamond Seuls. Police find big cache of Sinn Fein munitions in Ulster. Miss Lewis retained her world's tennis championship. Several people were injured in a Lake Shore railroad crash. Motorcyclist has back broken in an accident at Richmond Hill. U. F. O. movement is growing, not dying, says J. J. Morrison. Switzerland will adhere to convention for control of arms. Second big fire within a week does much damage in Kingston. Government troops chase Irish rebels from Wicklow hills. Mrs. Bickle of Toronto won the U. S. clay court tennis title. There are 151 candidates nominated to contest seats in Manitoba. United States troops mobilize to crush disorders in mining districts. Brewers bring cases to test amendments to Temperance Act. All bush workers are enlisted to fire bush fires in British Columbia. French steamer Lafayette was badly damaged in storm off coast of France.

TUESDAY.

Irish army rounding up rebel forces. Germany concedes financial control to the Allies. Lynch regained his bantamweight title by beating Buff. Opening of appeal of G.T.R. shareholders at Privy Council. Ontario may not be represented at the Irish Olympic games. Troops are in readiness in the United States to guard railways. U. S. customs official seize liquor on British ship at Jersey City. British House of Commons gives approval to Washington treaties. Delegation from Palestine issue anti-Jewish manifesto in London. Ottawa announces that Germany attempts to foil Canadian claimants. Whiskaway and Gray Lag are being matched to run at Empire City. One million and a quarter are idle in the United States through strikes. Toronto City Council refuses to take vacation until "clean-up" deal passes. Jock Hutchison turned in a card of 135, new United States open record. Two men were killed in a crash on a level crossing at Mount Dennis, Toronto. Forest fires in British Columbia appear to be under control with cooler weather. Provincial Cabinet Ministers pass responsibility on Belleville racing charter. Harry Greb successfully defended his light-heavyweight title against Lougram. Two Toronto men drown, one in the Humber and the other at Port Dalhousie. Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba believes no party will have majority in next Legislature. Chief of Police of Windsor says British Columbia liquor act works nicely; he says he saw no drunks there.

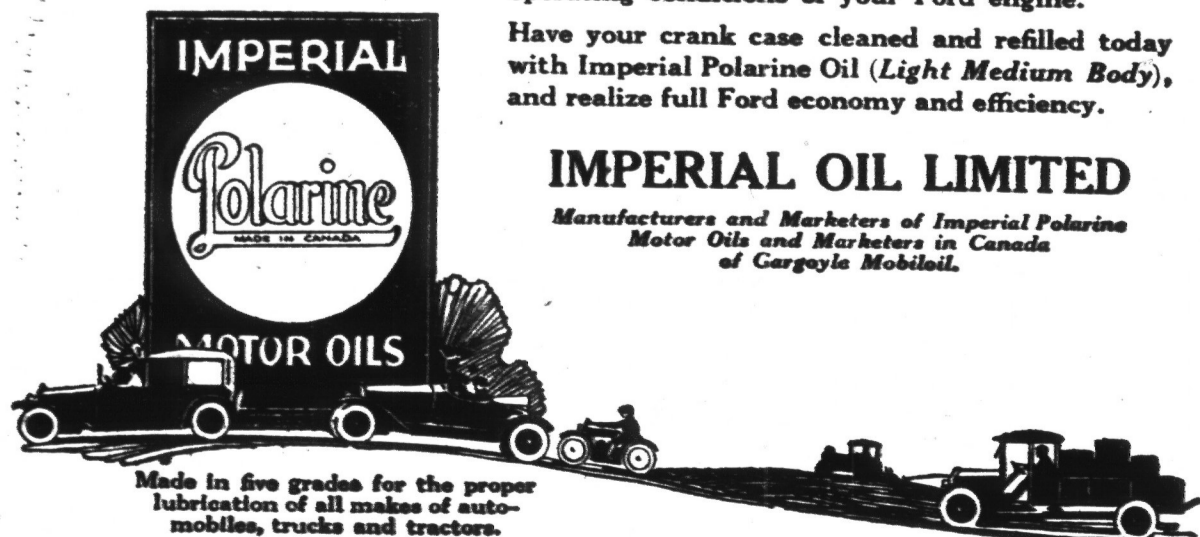
