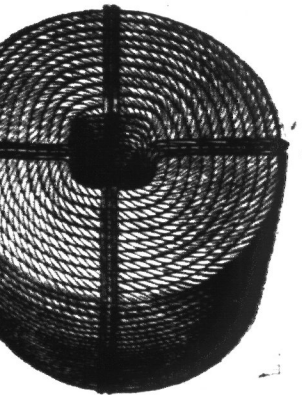

Church Services

St. Paul's Anglican
 Sermon on Sunday morning from Rev. 1:10. Subject—"The Lord's Day." St. John did not mean the old Lord's day but the new one instituted by Jesus Christ on the Resurrection morning, and observed by his apostles and by the whole church from that day until now. St. John was nearly one hundred years old when he received his revelation, and he must have observed during more than a half century the weekly first day commemoration of Christ's Resurrection. At Troas St. Paul found disciples partaking together of Holy Communion on the first day of the week and preached to them on that occasion. He urges the disciples at Corinth to honor the first day of the week by contributing on that particular day to the support of the church's financial necessities. The Christian's plain duty is to

give the things of Christ and God the first place. The Lord's gospel message; the Lord's consecrated house; the Lord's table of consecrated service; the Lord's household of faith, and, so too, the Lord's own day. These must have first place in our regard, otherwise our Christianity is called into question. "Let not your good be spoken of."
 The evening's discourse was from Acts 13:21-22, the subject being "God's choice compared with man's choice." Saul, a popular hero, was clamored for, whilst God was personally reigning by means of prophets and judges, and God granted by way of a judgment the people's request. But Saul proved untrue to both God and man and the nation's punishment was the fruit of their own choice. How are we choosing to-day? Is it, with us, always God and what He prescribes for us, or do we prefer "that way which seemeth good unto a man?"
