THE NEWS OF 37 YEARS AGO

Scarlet fever has broken out at Waterford.

The Hagersville baker is making regular trips to Jarvis.

Pearce Marlett was in town to-day looking as hale and hearty as ever. We notice that some of our streets are beautifully adorned with thistles.

Mrs. James Barber joined her husband in Detroit last Saturday evening. Dr. Howell, accompanied by his son, Bert, have come to New York to spend a week or so.

Revival meetings are being held every Sunday in the Indian Bush by the Delaware tribe.

Farmers in this vicinity are right into the middle of harvest. The crop is exceedingly good.

Robert Montgomery has gone to Hagersville, to take a place as clerk in D. J. Lynch's dry goods establishment.

Mrs. A. Alward of this village, left for Ireland last Thursday, where she intends stopping for some months visiting her relatives.

The result of the recount in the Scott Act election in St. Thomas gives thirteen of a majority for the Act. An appeal has been made in the Court of Appeal against this decision.

No one has been more missed in the House of Commons during the session just closed than Mr. David Thompson, the member for Haldimand. His absence from official duties has been an enforced one, and even yet his health is far from fully established. The Government has promised that his salary for the past session will be paid.

At the recent examination in Caledonia and Dunnville only 34 of the 72 candidates passed. Four of the five candidates from Jarvis passed with high marks as follows:—Ashton Langril, 459; George Norris, 444; Mary Johnston, 424; Albert Sanderson, 395. Necessary to pass, 375. Ashton Langril the maximum in arithmetic—100, being the only one of the 72 candidates who did so.

UNITED LINES, Ltd.

Many New Lines Contemplated. A Progressive Company.

It has developed that far reaching plans of very great importance for Jarvis are being laid by the United Lines, Limited.

The United Lines, Limited, is the new corporation organized to develop and stabilize the highway motor bus and freight truck industry throughout this country. They make it a part of their business to very closely work in connection with highway improvement and foster in every way possible the rapid improvement and reconstruction and betterment of the highways in the territories where they run, in order to inaugurate faster and more up-to-date bus and freight truck service.

It is understood they intend at a very early date to inaugurate through service into Port Dover from Jarvis. It is also understood that they have bought the equipment and are now painting it the United Lines, Limited, standard red to run on the Caledonia-Dunnville Line, and are planning service on east from Dunnville to Crystal Beach, and thus give through bus service from Crystal Beach through Dunnville, Caledonia and Hamilton into Toronto; as the United Lines through an operating arrangement have large Pierce Arrow buses operating out of their terminal in Hamilton through to Toronto.

Great Importance to Jarvis. The step that means much to Jarvis which it has been announced the United Lines intends to carry out, is the establishing of bus service through Jarvis from Simcoe on the west to Dunnville on the east. This service will be run through the territory from Cayuga through Nelles Corners, west to Jarvis and Simcoe, and will also be extended on west to Tillsonburg.

This cannot but mean a very large number of passengers daily will pass through Jarvis, and as Jarvis will be made an important junction changing point, it is sure to mean much in a commercial sense to Jarvis merchants and citizens.
