### Churches

**Wesley Methodist**  
Owing to the absence of the pastor to Conference, Rev. Mr. Dellar, of Port Dover Methodist Church, occupied the pulpit both morning and evening, and delivered two eloquent and inspiring sermons.

**St. Paul's Anglican**  
Last Sunday was Whitsunday—The Pentecost of the Christian church. The subject of the morning sermon was "The Descent of the Holy Spirit." In it the following points were dwelt upon:

1. God's people gathered together in one place in obedience to a Divine command.
2. Their attitude, one of eager expectation as awaiting the fulfillment of a promise.
3. The promise fulfilled—"The Holy Ghost descended upon them."
4. The effects of His coming upon those assembled in the upper room, upon ourselves and upon the world at large.

The discourse was based on the account given by St. Luke in the 2nd chapter of the Acts of the Apostles. The evening sermon was about "The Gifts of the Spirit." Text, 1st Cor. XII. 2.

The services were well attended. In the absence of the organist, Miss Rodgers, the organ was played by Miss Reynolds.

### Knox Presbyterian

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was dispensed to one of the largest, if not the largest number of communicants in the history of the church. Rev. M. E. Siple assisted the minister. The theme was God in Calvary. The speaker showed that the plan of Redemption ran all through the Bible. No man can redeem another, only the God man can. All theories and theologies must be swept away before the cross of Christ, which stands as an everlasting emblem of God's redeeming love.

Francis Xavier formed the basis of the evening subject. He was a gay young cavalier, who lived in the golden age of Spanish story. After a season of gaiety he went to Paris and became a professor. One of his students was Ignatius Loyola. Through the influence of this student Xavier was brought to Christ. The impelling motive of his life was Matt-16: 26. "For what is a man profited... soul." He burned with a desire to preach Christ to all men. He travelled far and wide, even reaching Japan. After 10 years of strenuous warfare he laid down his life on the beach in Shim. He died with a smile on his lips. His life is a rebuke to our modern apathy and bids Christians be up and doing.

### The Late James Miller

There occurred at his residence on Saturday, June 3rd, 1922, the passing of Jarvis' oldest resident, in the person of Mr. James Miller. If Mr. Miller had lived until July he would have celebrated his 90th birthday. Deceased had been in failing health for some time and only recently underwent an operation, in the hope of having his health restored. But the hopes expressed were not realized, and on Saturday forenoon he passed quietly away. The late James Miller moved in from the farm about two years ago came to Jarvis to live here. An aged widow is left to mourn the loss of her life's companion. There were ten children, nine of whom are left to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father. Those living are:—Six sons, Robert, Nathan, George and Edward, of Walpole and Andrew and Gordon, of Miller Bros., Jarvis. The three daughters are Mrs. J. I. Smith and Mrs. J. Jacques of Walpole Township, and Mrs. W. Law, of Woodhouse. Three aged brothers are also among the relatives who have suffered by the removal of the deceased, viz: Mr. William Miller, of Rainham Township, in his 92nd year; Mr. Robert Miller, Jarvis, in his 87th year; Mr. Alex Miller, of Port Dover, in his 84th year. The two latter were present at the funeral.
