County Council Proceedings

Second Session

FIRST DAY -

(Continued from last week)

Hamilton-Brown—That the report of Supply Committee, be received and read, carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen—We, your Supply Committee, beg leave to report as follows:

1. That we met at the House of Refuge on February 6, and decided not to ask for tenders for supplies but to leave same in the hands of the Manager and Home Committee to secure supplies from time to time as necessity requires.

2. That we have had the ice put in at the gaol and recommend payment of same and that the supplies for coal be bought from time to time by Mr. Walsh and J. A. Toohay as necessity requires. All of which is respectfully submitted. (Signed), Charles Patton, Chairman.

Report adopted as read.

MacDonald-Gleny—That the report of the Home Committee be received and read, carried.

To the Warden and Gentlemen of the County Council:

Your Home Committee beg leave to submit the following report:

There are at present 34 inmates of the House of Refuge—20 males and 14 females. Also Mrs. Sharp with four children. They were burnt out about the 20th of January.

There has been two deaths at the House since our last report—Mrs. Buck of Jarvis and Mr. John Simms of Seneca.

There has been one commitment—Mr. Freeman Johnson, committed by Mr. Thomas Camelford. Mr. Johnson will be a pay inmate.

We have examined the accounts for maintenance and supplies, find them correct, and would recommend same to the Finance Committee for payment. (Signed), Thomas Camelford, Chairman.

Report adopted as read.

Clark-Martindale—That we adjourn and form ourselves into a committee of the whole with Dr. Berry in the chair, carried.

Hamilton-Patton—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

Clark-Martindale—That we now adjourn to meet tomorrow at 10 a.m. carried.

SECOND DAY

Friday, Feb. 17, 1922.

All the members present except Mr. Camelford, Deputy Reeve of Dunnville. The Warden in the chair.

Buckley-Smeiser—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

Miller-Patton—That the report of the committee of the whole be received and read, carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:

Gentlemen—We, your committee of the whole, beg leave to report as follows:

1. Re National Sanitarium Association; That we make a grant of \$1000 to same.

2. Re postponement of Gas hearing, that on account of gas companies not having furnished us with any particulars in the case that we will ask for an adjournment of the case.

3. Mr. Butler, an immigration agent from Dunnville, advised the council re intending immigration scheme; that the following be a committee to inquire into the matter and report at next meeting, viz: Messrs. W. A. Houser, W. C. Hamilton and Geo. Montgomery.

4. Re Police Court Fines; that this question be laid over until next meeting.

5. Re Provincial Municipal Association Fee; that no action be taken.

6. Re petition of Rentrow and Glangarry; that we endorse same.

7. Re Tax Exemptions; that no action be taken.

8. That we do now adjourn. All of which is respectfully submitted. (Signed), R. N. Berry, chairman.

Hamilton-Patton—That the report of the committee of the whole be adopted as read. Lost.

Houser-Clark—That the matter of the adoption of the committee of the whole be re-opened, carried.

Miller-Brown—That the report of the committee of the whole be adopted as read, carried.

Houser-Buckley—That the report of the Good Roads committee be received and read, carried.

Brown-McDonald—That we do now adjourn to meet at 1.15 p.m. Carried.

Martindale-Clark—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair, carried.

MacDonald-Gleny—That the report of the Good Roads committee be adopted as read. Lost.

Houser-Smeiser—That we issue debentures to cover all indebtedness to the Provincial Government in connection with the construction of the Provincial Highway if necessary, carried.

Houser-Buckley—That the report of the Good Roads committee be re-opened and considered, carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council: Gentlemen—Your Good Roads committee beg leave to report as follows:

1. We have examined carefully the

accounts presented by the Superintendent and would recommend them for payment.

2. We have also examined the pay lists presented by the Superintendent and recommend them for payment.

3. Would recommend that the Warden and Geo. Montgomery be delegates to Ontario Good Roads Association to be held in Toronto on March 1, 2 and 3.

4. That the claims for damages to crop from W. J. Ridley and Miss A. Muchmore, that no action be taken.

5. That the Province be asked to assume whole cost of Provincial Highways.

6. That the Superintendent advertise in the local papers of the county drawing the public's attention to the Act re loads of vehicles during March and April on public highways.

7. Would recommend that the expenditures on the county highway system for 1922 be 100,000 as per detailed statement attached therewith.

8. That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the Workman's Compensation Board for the balance due on total actual assessment for 1921 and Provisional assessment for 1922 if certified correct by superintendent.
