Jarvis Council Meeting

City Fathers Hold Regular Monthly Gathering—Only Routine Business Done

Jarvis, March 7th, 1922.

The third regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the Village of Jarvis was held in the Council Chamber, all of the members present; the Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of the last meeting were read.

It was moved by N. R. Pond and seconded by R. T. Shaver—that the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read. (Carried.)

It was moved by R. T. Shaver and seconded by T. McNeil—that the following accounts be accepted and paid:—Municipal World, supplies, \$17.38; Jas. Walker, keep of tramp, \$1.50; R. A. Nelles, keep of two tramps, \$4.00; A. Rodgers, registering births, marriages and deaths, \$4.50 (Carried.)

A communication was read from Hamilton Chamber of Commerce re daylight savings. No action was taken.

It was moved by I. W. Holmes and seconded by R. T. Shaver—that the Reeve be empowered to have Messrs. Arrell and Arrell prepare the proper by-laws regarding the taking over of the Jarvis Memorial Park. (Carried.)

It was moved by T. McNeil and seconded by I. W. Holmes—that the Medical Health Officer's salary be \$25.00 per annum; that the Board of Health's fee, including the clerk, be \$2.00 per meeting; and that the corporate seal be attached to this resolution to give it the force and effect of a by-law. (Carried.)

It was moved by R. T. Shaver and seconded by N. R. Pond—that the clerk be and is hereby instructed to notify Herbert Peacock to have all implements and other vehicles belonging to him removed from the streets within this corporation, and in future to keep the said streets adjoining his property clear of such articles; and that he shall not operate a tractor over the sidewalk without protecting same with plank covering. (Carried.)

It was moved by R. T. Shaver and seconded by N. R. Pond—that we do now adjourn until the next regular meeting at 7.30 p. m. at the call of the Reeve. (Carried.)

States, spoke of the wisdom of Ontario's road policy in allowing the foundations to rest before undertaking permanent surfacing. Many of the failures in his country were due to lack of this policy. It might have the fault of making the people impatient at the long period elapsing before the finishing of a road, but it was the soundest and most economical procedure.

The President, Mr. T. J. Maloney pointed out the various classes of roads and their functions. The Provincial roads were designed to carry the bulk of the heavy traffic, the county roads to supplement them. As far as mileage was concerned the township roads were the most important of the three.

THURSDAY, MARCH 2nd.

The first subject taken up was "How should Provincial Highway be Paid For." Warden F. H. Richardson, of Ontario County, the first speaker, suggested that the present policy be continued, except that that the cities be taxed more heavily, in proportion to population for the building of roads leading out from them. This was strongly objected to by the eastern counties, as they thought the Provincial Government should bear the entire cost of the Provincial Roads. Some of the city representatives also objected to this suggestion, claiming that their taxes were too high now, on account of the unemployment problem.

The convention adjourned to go to the Government House for tea, and the banquet at the King Edward Hotel in the evening.

Berry Miller—that a by-law be introduced and read a first time authorizing the Warden and Clerk to sign a bond of indemnity to Standard Bank for \$120,000. Carried.

By-law read second and third time and passed.

Glenny-Montgomery—that a committee be appointed to attend a meeting at Toronto in regards the Province taking over the full cost of constructing Provincial Highways, and that Geo. Miller, Wm. C. Clark and W. A. Houser be the committee. Carried.

Berry-Miller—that a by-law be introduced and read a first time making a grant of one thousand dollars to the National Sanitarium payable in equal payments quarterly. Carried.

By-law read a second and third time and passed.

Toohy-Montgomery—that the members of the Building Committee, Mr. Martindale and Miller be a committee to meet Judge Hopkins to arrange for the resting of Judge's residence. Carried.

Miller-Patton—that owing to the increased labours in connection with the County Treasurer's office and duties in connection therewith, that this council make an increase in the salary of the County Treasurer of \$200 per annum and that a by-law be prepared and read a first time in connection therewith. Carried.

Buckley-Smelter—that the report of the Building committee be received and read. Carried.
