The Haldimand County Council Holds Session

A Large Amount of Business Transacted by Our County Legislators — Many Accounts Ordered Paid.

Third Session

Cayuga, Thursday, March 9, 1922.
Council met pursuant to adjournment. All the members present. The Warden in the chair.
Buckley-Smelter—That we resume business with the Warden in the chair. carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were read.
Toohy-Shipway—That the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read. carried.

The following communications were then read:

1. National Sanitarium, thanking the council for grant.
2. Hon. F. C. Biggs, acknowledging petition asking government to assume all cost of the construction of highways.

3. E. A. Strout, farm agent, read advertising in England.
4. County of Oxford asking for a repeal of Highway Improvement Act which requires County Superintendent to be graduates in civil engineering.

5. Children's Aid Society, asking for an opportunity for a deputation to address the Council.

6. A. E. Ames & Co., suggesting that in any issue of debentures that they carry a rate of 5 or 5 1/2 per cent.

7. Department of Public Works of Canada, that the Dominion Government will not spend any more on the York Bridge or assume the responsibility in connection therewith.

Miller-Berry—That Messrs. Brown, MacDonald and Shipway be a committee no communications. carried.

Shipway-Glenny—That the report of the committee appointed to investigate the cost of advertising the County be received and read. carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:
Gentlemen—The Committee appointed to investigate the cost of advertising the County beg leave to report as follows:

We met in Dunnville on Saturday, March 4, got prices from various printers the lowest price for a pamphlet 5 x 7 in. of 3 pages of closely printed matter for 3000 copies, \$50; more copies in like proportions, 10 pages \$62.50; 12 pages \$75, etc. The paper to be of good smooth quality.

We have opened tenders for the leasing of the flats belonging to the county to Mr. Andy Stickle for the year 1922 for the sum of \$20.

We also recommend that floor carpet or matting be secured for the Sheriff's office.

Toohy-Miller—That the Warden and Treasurer sign notes taking up \$5,000.00 from the credit with the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the same be applied to the General Fund. carried.

Hamilton-Patton—That the Home committee report be received and read. carried.

To the Warden and Members of the County Council:
Gentlemen—We, your Home committee, beg leave to submit the following report:

We met at the House of Refuge on March 6.

There is at present thirty-three inmates of the Home—13 females and 20 males. There has also been one commitment, that of Thomas Ford of Caledonia, by Dr. R. N. Berry.

Your committee would recommend the purchase of a wheel chair for the House of Refuge from Messrs. Brett & Manson, of Dunnville, at a cost not to exceed \$35 and that the purchase of the said chair be left to Home committee.

We further recommend that the manager, Mr. George H. Brown, be given permission to purchase cinders to be used on the driveway to the Home at a cost not to exceed \$40.00.

We have examined the accounts and found them correct, and would recommend same paid.

Toohy-Martindale—That a bylaw be introduced and read a first time for the purpose of making a grant of \$3283.95 to the Village of Cayuga under the provisions of the Highway Improvement Act. carried.

Miller-Berry—That the bylaw fixing the salary of the County Treasurer at \$1650.00 be read a second time. carried.

Patton-Hamilton—That the bylaw fixing the salary of the County Treasurer at \$1650 be read a third time, signed, sealed and numbered and entitled a bylaw as in the original motion. carried.

Buckley-Houser—That the report of the Printing and Insurance committee be received and read. carried.

To the Warden and Members of the county council:
Gentlemen—We, your Printing and Insurance committee, beg leave to report as follows:

That we have renewed the bond of the county Treasurer with the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company. Amount insured \$20,000, premium \$90, which we recommend to Finance committee for payment to H. J. Hoshal.
