### Haldimand County Juvenile Court

Col. J. C. Massie has been notified by the department of the Attorney-General, that an order in-council has been passed establishing a juvenile court in and for the County of Haldimand, and appointing Col. Massie as judge of such court. The order goes into effect as soon as the Dominion Government has proclaimed the Juvenile Delinquent Act to be effective in this county.

The Children's Aid Society some time ago enlisted the support of the County Council and of the Danville Council by way of resolutions asking that this court be established. Such courts are a great success and we doing a great work in Brant and Grey Counties, and many of the leading cities.

In this court, the judge instead of the usual procedure, may place the offending children on probation under the supervision of the committee of the Children's Aid Society, of which Mr. C. R. Bilgar is inspector and probation officer. The public aside from the relative and court officers, are not admitted to this court and no newspaper reports permitted.

A special provision is made to safeguard the interests of the children. The act goes into great detail, even providing that the Probation Committee must have members of the same religious faith of the child realize.

The whole intent of the law is to make the child realize that the authorities are trying to help him, and not primarily to administer punishment.

## With Our Churches

**Knox Presbyterian**  
Rev. A. W. Hare, the minister, occupied the pulpit of Knox church both morning and evening. In the morning his subject was: "Saved by His Defects." The example of Zachaeus, who because he was small of stature, climbed up a tree in order that he might see the Lord when he passed by. In the case of Zachaeus it was the means of bringing salvation to his house. The speaker went on to prove that our defects and shortcomings can be made the stepping stones to positions that seem at times impossible to reach. If it not the person with the greatest number of talents who makes the best showing, but though a person may only have one little talent if properly employed it is a keystone to undreamed of success. Abraham Lincoln was born in a log house, but he became the greatest president United States ever had. In the evening, Rev. Mr. Hare, commenced his special series of sermons on the texts of great men. The first character taken up was that of Livingstone. One of his favorite texts was: "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee", "Lo I am with you even unto the end of the world." The speaker showed that Livingstone, no matter under what circumstances he found himself always had confidence in God. He kept his faith to the last and one morning when his faithful native helpers went to call him they found him on his knees, but his spirit had taken its flight to the God who created him. Truly it can be said:

"Lives of great men oft remind us,  
We can make our lives sublime;  
And departing leave behind us,  
Footprints on the sands of time."

**St. Paul's Anglican**  
The Rector, Rev. G. B. Wreford, preached two able and beautiful sermons on Sunday. In the morning his subject was: "The keeping power of God."
