## EDITORIAL

### The Irish Problem

The riddle of the century and how it can be properly solved seems to me to be that vexatious and perplexing Irish problem. For the past six years or over the Emerald Isle has been in the throes of internal (some would say infernal) strife. The question of Home Rule for Ireland has been the nightmare of a long procession of British Premiers for the past hundred years and more. The smartest and brainiest political leaders that Great Britain has developed have all had a try at solving the riddle, but without success crowning their efforts.

As a result of the recent negotiations between the Provisional Irish Government and the Lloyd George Administration, an equitable arrangement has been arrived at.

Ulster, the northern part of Ireland, is to be permitted to retain her status as an integral part of the British Empire, while the rest of the country is to be known as the Irish Free State, being placed on a self-governing plane similar to that enjoyed by Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa.

For a number of years an adventurer of questionable antecedents known as DeValera, has been President of the Irish Republican Government. Recently when the Dail convened to consider the offer of the British Government made to Ireland he resisted the adoption of the times. But the Dail voted in favor of the acceptance and a new President elected in the person of Michael Collins.

Now the deposed President, DeValera, says that if the treaty which is shortly to be voted on by the people, is accepted that there will be civil war in Ireland.

There is no doubt that if the Irish people had only been fortunate enough to have chosen a leader who was not a British-hating fanatic, that the vexed Irish problem would have been settled to the satisfaction of all parties concerned months ago. Now that a majority of the Dail have expressed themselves in favor of accepting the peace overtures made by Great Britain, DeValera, like a person whose feelings have run away with his reason, is threatening to plunge Ireland into all the evils of civil war. Surely the people of Ireland will not allow themselves to be further misled by this adventurer, whose British-hating tendencies have been the cause of the death of hundreds of true patriots of Ireland.

At the present time the prospects of peace in Ireland are very remote. The daily papers of Monday have accounts of fighting between the different factions in Belfast, and a number of fatalities have been reported. Michael Collins denounces DeValera in scathing terms for the cowardly campaign of murder and arson that he is responsible for. In a speech at Waterford, Ireland, on Sunday he said:

"Ireland never witnessed a more sinister or more cowardly campaign. The wretches of the north-east and south have united and it is an unholy brotherhood. I have been invited to meet Sir James Craig and Premier Lloyd George in London. The greatest argument that I shall be forced to face will be the contention of DeValera and the Craig supporters that Belfast would not dream of coming into the Free State while the present division prevails in the south."

Michael Collins evidently has the true interests of his country at heart and is perfectly willing to make way for any one who could unite the people of his country, in order that peace may be speedily obtained. But DeValera is the fire brand who is causing all the trouble and the sooner the people of Ireland realize that he is a very undesirable leader and a menace to the well-

being of their country the better it will be for all concerned. The Irish people ought to make this Spanish adventurer a present of a hamper necktie, and then under sane leadership Ireland will soon take her place in the vanguard of the nations of the world.

There are no better people under the sun than the Irish and we hope that they will see the folly of being misled as they are at present, and take their rightful place among the people of the earth.

### That "Party" and After

That "Party" recently held in the Legislative Halls at Queen's Park, Toronto, has certainly "stirred up" things, and Ontario papers are giving columns to it. We believe that Ontario's Attorney-General, Hon. Mr. Raney, will take the matter up and sift it thoroughly, and it is certainly up to the Drury Government to leave no stone unturned in exposing the guilty parties.

The following is the celebration taken from the columns of the Toronto Globe, and we present it to our readers without further comment, in order that the people of this section can read the opinions of the press in different parts of the province on this breach of the Ontario Temperance Act:

"The 'last night' party, held, it is stated, without Hon. Peter Smith's knowledge or consent in his room at the Parliament Buildings during the closing sitting of the Legislature in 1921, is the chief subject of conversation throughout the province. Many exaggerated and misleading statements are made as to the general standard of morals among members of the House, and unless a more explicit explanation is forthcoming from the Premier, the Attorney-General, the Speaker, or some other person deputed to speak for the bulk of the members, the 'party' is likely to cost not a few legislators who had nothing to do with it, their seats when the next election is held.

"The Port Hope Guide, in a comment on the affair, uses phrases indicating belief that misconduct was general. It says: 'The end of the session was celebrated with obvious results to many of those taking part. It was a disgraceful but a jolly party. Young women typists were sent for.' In another passage the Guide speaks of 'this orgy of debauch.' Mr. Drury must begin to understand that the use of phrases such as these from The Port Hope Guide will do immense harm to the Ministry and to Parliamentary Government in this Province if permitted to spread over the length and breadth of Ontario, and they are spreading to-day without contradiction.

"The implication of immorality as well as drunkenness is not one that should be allowed to pass unchallenged as applied to 'many of those taking part.' When the Port Hope Guide says, 'Ye have made it a den of thieves' may well be applied to Queen's Park, a complete and frank statement of what actually took place, with the names of the members involved, becomes vital to the preservation of the reputation of the members of the House, and of the respect in which they are held by their constituents.

"The Globe believes that speaking generally, the standard of conduct of the members of the present Legislature will compare most favorably with that of any other elected since Confederation. Things tolerated in the past would be impossible to-day. In former times there might have been seen one of the most prominent men in the public life of the province carried into a 'party' into his rooms by two faithful friends in the fashion in which drinks are still handled where there is no 'patrol wagon.' It is known to many citizens of Toronto that after another Parliament Buildings 'party' a public man of the highest intellectual attainment knew so little of where he was or what he was doing that he mounted the 'dicky' of a vacant cab and drove off furiously, attended in his evening clothes and hatless. Mr. Sam. Clarke, who hates pretence, says liquor was not only used freely within the precincts of the House, but that it was kept for sale.

But these are not the old days when the saloon flourished and drinking was not only legal but

respectable. The liquor traffic has been outlawed in Ontario. The members of the present Legislature gave effect to the vote by which the electors abolished the traffic. The real offense of the legislators who still drink liquor in public places is that they bring into contempt the laws they themselves have made, and render law enforcement vastly more difficult than it would be if lawbreakers outside were certain that the men who make the laws really mean business.

"If the details of the last night 'party'—which was a very amusing 'orgy,' if the word is not entirely inappropriate—remain hidden, it is entirely probable that the cause of prohibition will be injured even more seriously than the reputation of the ninety or more members of the Legislature who are altogether unaware of the peril in which their position as public men had been placed by the folly of a few of their number. The appropriate thing would be a voluntary admission of participation by those who did take part in 'illegal drinking' and a public promise to Mr. Speaker never to offend again.
