## NEWS TOPICS OF WEEK

### Important Events Which Have Occurred During the Week.

The Busy Week's Happenings Carefully Compiled and Put Into Handy and Attractive Shape for the Readers of Our Paper—A Solid Hour's Enjoyment.

#### WEDNESDAY.

Ty. Cobb is ill with the grippe. Pittsburg lost to St. Paul, 5 to 4. Budget debate opens in Legislature.

British troops are disarming Sikhs in Punjab. St. Patricks beat Vancouver, 2 to 1, in overtime. The Allied Ministers will revise Sevrea treaty. The House of Lord will not block the Irish treaty. Abbe Delorme will stand trial on a murder charge. Presbyterian Moderator opposes increase in his stipend. Mrs. Annie Silverman collapses on Toronto street and dies.

Lecturer in London is dismissed for kissing a girl student. 600,000 miners in United States to quit work on March 31. University of Pennsylvania runners have sailed for England.

A bill is before the British Commons to penalize non-voters. Lloyd George will take seat in House April 3 and demand a vote. The Ontario Municipal Electrical Association hold meeting in Toronto. Manitoba Legislature to spend one week in passing essential legislation. Minister of Labor sends a strong protest against miners "strike on job."

The opponents of waterways scheme present case to Cabinet at Ottawa. Jarvis C. I. seniors won the eastern section of the C. I. Basketball League.

MacCallum Grant has been accorded a second term as Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia. Toronto police are active in investigating developments in the case of Ambrose Small, the missing millionaire.

Maj.-Gen. J. H. MacBrien proposes that only men of service age be instructed in the use of the rifle at target shooting.

#### THURSDAY.

Sir John Eaton continues to improve. Allies propose truce to Greeks and Turks. Final terms on reparations sent to Germany. Sniping continues in frontier area of Ulster.

Toronto tax rate was struck at 32.35 mills. S. coal operators still refuse to hold conference. Over 400 settlers from Scotland arrive at Halifax.

Irish Republican army in revolt against Free State. Labor in Ireland is weary of broils and calls for peace. The Prince of Wales get a warm welcome at Colombo.

Earth tremors were felt in Missouri and Tennessee. The Grand Lodge of the I.O.O.F. is in session at Brantford. Western provinces are at variance over freight rate reductions. Drury Government gets 29 majority on first division of session.

Progressive M. P. from Cariboo, B.C., decries Oriental invasion. Hon. Manning Doherty issues spirited reply to bankers' circular. Immigration Minister wants farmers with capital as immigrants.

Parties in Manitoba prepare to wage hot war in coming election. Hamilton man murders wife who threatens to betray him to police. Premier Drury at Welland tells of plans to reforest huge Ontario areas. Government discloses plans for wider powers of High Commissioner. "Buck" Herzog will have charge of the baseball in the United States army.

Granites of Toronto won the Allan Cup by defeating Regina Victorias, 13-2, on the round. Two children were drowned when lee breaks under them in Halifax county, Nova Scotia.

#### FRIDAY.

Vancouver defeated St. Patricks, 3 to 0. St. Marys were tied by Guelph, 4 to 4. French Cabinet views Genoa Conference askance.

Two men drop dead in Toronto from heart failure. Plans of liquor smugglers revealed at Hamilton hearing. An Arctic blizzard swept the coast of France for 48 hours. William Tilden II will not defend his tennis title this year. Railway Commission chairman displays concern for consumer. Foreign Ministers discuss security for minorities in Asia Minor. Lloyd George says national unity necessary to future prosperity. One child killed and two badly hurt by automobiles in Toronto. Premier Drury insists on two retractions by members in the Legislature.

Debate on the address from the throne ends without amendment from the Opposition. Canada receives \$6,000,000 in payment of the cost of the Canadian army of occupation in German territory. Legislature stirred by W. A. Crockett, who declared that parties did not carry out the wishes of the people.

A disturbing large number of crimes are occurring on the shores of the Arctic, says Northwest Mounted Police. Red League in South Mexico are banding Indians into a society. They are particularly antagonistic to the Roman Catholic Church. Government supporter in New Brunswick says the time has come when a new system of retail distribution of liquor must be undertaken. When his airplane took a nose-

dive to earth from 1,000 feet in the air. Capt. McCausland, Royal Air Force, England, jumped when twenty feet from the ground, and was uninjured.

#### SATURDAY.

Ulster border is armed camp for rival forces. Allied conference discusses Dardanelles issue. British ports crowded with unemployed ships. Toronto trundlers rolled high scores at Toledo. Political crisis in Bulgaria over elections from alphabet. Officers on trail of Quebec plot to flood country with liquor. Skating Club carnival in Toronto was a magnificent spectacle. The Senate of the United States ratifies the four-power treaty. Minister of Finance estimates out many millions of nation's bills. Merchants Bank former president and general manager are prosecuted. A farmer lassoed a deer in the St. Lawrence river, near Brockville. A two-months-old baby was abandoned on a train near London, Ont. United States coal miners go on record against a separate state agreement.

Ford Motor Co. will adopt the 40-hour week, with a minimum wage of \$6 a day. The new White Star-Dominion liner Regina, on her maiden voyage, docked at Halifax Friday morning. European immigrants are anxious to start for new world with first rush. The port of Libau is congested with them. A tidal wave swept along the northern shore of the Adriatic, flooding villages and extending as far as Trieste. Attorney-General lays charge against Gooderham & Worts' distillery for shipping whiskey illegally to the border. A bill passed the committee to amend the Assessment Act so that heads of families will be exempted \$200 on dependents others than children. British "Tommy" in uniform, beat off two thugs in New York who were beating up a German; he then bound up wounds and carried the man to the hospital.

#### MONDAY.

St. Patricks blanked Vancouver, 6 to 0. Soviet delegation leaves Moscow for Genoa. Michael Collins issues challenge to de Valera. Sterling at Toronto, \$4.51; at New York, \$4.38. Faction of Sinn Fein army declares for a republic. Allied Ministers decide on control of Dardanelles. Music Hall won the Grand National Steeplechase. Miners in the United States awaiting date of strike. Yale boxers won at Queen's University on Saturday. A man died in Belleville from drinking wood alcohol. J. Morrison of Toronto is again Canadian chess champion. Tottenham Hotspurs were eliminated from the English Cup. A little girl in Toronto, tired of school, attempts to end her life. The Attorney-General takes his hand in untangling the Small mystery. A boiler explosion in ferry dock opposite Sarnia spreads destruction. Figures presented to Parliament support Toronto's case for port office. The United States Government sends a second note on Rhine debt. London Shamrocks won the L.O.B.A. championship from Toronto. School trustees from suburban areas press their claims on the Government.

The needs of the consumer is being considered in the hearing of freight rates case. A Hamilton man was struck down on Toronto-Hamilton Highway by an autoist who kept going. Members of Toronto Typographical Union celebrated on Saturday the inauguration of the nine-hour day. All the old-timers were present. County Judge Coughlin at Sandwich delivered judgment quashing conviction of Essex Export Co., and says the company have federal charter to export liquor to borders and cannot be interfered with.

#### TUESDAY.

The Orioles have signed Catcher McAvoy. Irish leaders to hold conference in London. Allies concede nearly all Turkish demands. Bolivia concede nearly all Turkish demands. Sultan will continue to hold Constantinople. Health of Hamilton shows great improvement. First brush between Valerites and Free Staters. Straits of Dardanelles to be open to navigation. The Leafs defeated Alabama University, 10 to 5. War shaping up in Siberia between Reds and Whites. Bolivia sends delegates to Tacuaria conference. Bobby Eber defeated Mickey Delmont in Hamilton. Canada and Mexico are reaching toward a trade compact. Canada must have immigrants, says B. C. Minister of Lands. Drury Ministry hotly assailed as "dodging responsibility." Lady member of Commons heard for the first time in debate. The Dominion Bank team won the round from Winnipeg Royals. Chippawa expenditures likely to be probed by a royal commission.
