Haldimand Jersey Breaks Canadian Record

"Saddle of Hillcrest," 11643, the world's champion two-year-old milk producer and Canadian Champion for milk and butter, has this year finished another record as a three-year-old, winning the three-year-old record for Canada for both milk and butter, producing 16,650 lbs. milk and 1,100 lbs. butter.

Saddle finished her record on the 8th of April and freshened on the 9th, and immediately took milk fever, Dr. J. Jacques, V.S., of Fisherville, worked for hours and finally succeeded in saving the little fawn cow. Saddle of Hillcrest is owned by Russell Daley, Selkirk, Ont.

Great Baseball Performance

The feat of Chas. Robertson, White Sox pitcher, performed against the Tigers at Detroit Sunday, in turning back 27 batters in succession, allowing no hits and no player reaching first base, has been equalled but five times in the history of big league baseball.

- John Richmond, Worcester, June 12, 1880, against Cleveland.
- John H. Ward, Providence, June 17, 1880, against Buffalo.
- Cy Young, Boston, May 5, 1906, against the Athletics.
- Addie Joss, Cleveland, October 2, 1908, against the White Sox.

The New Highway

MacConnell & Hicklin, the contractors who have the contract for the completion of the new Highway from Nelles Corners through Jarvis up to the Norfolk line have opened up offices in Jarvis, with Mr. Hicklin in personal charge. He informs us that work will commence at once and a working crew will be placed at each end of the line. The stone for the east end part of the road will come from the Nelles Corners quarries, and that used at the Jarvis end will be hauled from the company's quarries at Hagersville. They will be about 150 men employed and 20 trucks used for hauling the crushed stone. Mr. Hicklin informed a "Record" representative that he expects to have the part adjacent to Jarvis completed in three months and the whole 10 1/2 miles of road completed by October. Mr. McLean has the contract for the four miles west in Norfolk and he will be on the job soon. When this work is completed there will be a first-class road from Jarvis to Simcoe. Contracts have been awarded for the grading of the highway from Nelles Corners to Cayuga. The only piece of road that will not be in good condition after those under way are done, is the one from Jarvis to Port Dover. The representative people of the districts through which the Port Dover branch passes should get together and try and induce the government to keep the road up to the same standard as the other portions will be shortly.

From Chicago to the Coast
