From Chicago to The Coast

(Continued from Page 1)

"Passing through Colorado by night, morning found us amid the wild, strange scenery of New Mexico. Here we travelled through the desert, with rocks and hills out into fantastic shapes by the winter storms all around us, with here and there a distant view of some great peak of the American Rockies. Here and there were the Adobe dwellings of the Indians at Albuquerque we saw large numbers of them on the platform in their curious attire and with rugs and cushions for seats.

"Monday morning early we reached the grand Canyon. Leaving the train, a few steps brought us to the front of the great El Tovar hotel. Here the ground suddenly sinks at our feet to a depth of 1500 feet and the river, here about 60 yards wide, may be seen like a silver cloud more than a mile beneath us, winding through the gloomy gorges of this enormous chasm, 217 miles long and from 9 to 15 miles in width. A drive of some fourteen miles along the river gave us other opportunities of viewing this stupendous gorge and see the bright Angelo, the Hermit Trails, winding down to the bottom.

"Not only is the depth of this great gorge stupendous but mountains there, hundreds of feet high rise at our feet, their tops still far beneath us.

"But beyond all this, these peaks and precipices are all colored by nature and assume the most marvellous tints, varying all the day long. We shall long remember the great gorge about sunset, its vast depths already plunged in gloom, but its walls and pinnacles bathed in crimson, shading off into old rose and a delicate pink, whilst afar off across the desert I noticed the snow clad peaks of the San Francisco mountains of Arizona.

"Tuesday morning found us climbing the Canyon Pass and watching the giant 'Yuccas' Cactas and Aloe, that grew beside the line.

"From the summit we quickly descended into the ripening orange groves of California. We passed San Bernardino, and Pasadena, famous for its lovely homes, enclosed in flowers, and stopping at Los Angeles only long enough to change trains we were soon running beside the blue waters of the Pacific Ocean, whose waves were breaking upon the shore in lines of white foam.

"Six o'clock found us at our destination, as San Diego is beautiful bay, overlooked by Point Lomas and protected from the ocean by the Peninsula of Coronado. Here we were kindly met by the Rector of All Saints church and the church warden of St. James, whose car soon conveyed us to the hotel, which for a few days is to be our quarters in the beautiful City of the Sun, as San Diego is worthily called."

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FLOWERS FROM SEED

Ready and Fragrant for All at Very Small Cost.

Most Annuals May Be Sown Indoors For an Early Start—A Few Simple Suggestions Suggested for Success and Other Points—Annuals May Be Transplanted.

Among the varieties that should be started early indoors are Petunias, Verbenas, Antirrhinum (Snapdragon), Pentstemon glaberrimus, Salvia, Ageratum, Centaurea cyanocephala (Dusty Miller), Erythrum (Golden Feather), and Lobelia. The four kinds last named being of a dwarf habit of growth are very useful for planting around the edge of flower borders. The Lobelia does best in light soil and where it does not get too much sun. The first named varieties being of a taller habit of growth (one or two feet) are best sited for the centre of flower beds or borders. There are no summer decorative plants that can be raised from seed that will make a finer and more continuous display in the flower garden during summer than those named, if the seed is started early in a window, hot bed, or greenhouse and the plants given even ordinary care and attention. If sown out of doors early in May they are very late in flowering. All the plants before named will also be found very useful for helping to fill up window and veranda boxes, rustic stands, and hanging baskets. Being of a perennial or lasting nature, many of them can also be successfully dug up in the autumn before frost, and placed in pots or boxes for indoor decoration during early winter. Those late in flowering, such as Ageratum, Snapdragon and Pentstemon are especially useful for this purpose. Seed should be saved from the best types of all the plants named during the summer months for the next spring sowing. The Dusty Miller does not seed the first year, as a rule. A supply of cuttings may also be obtained from most of the plants named, if the old plants are kept in a cool window during winter.

Tall Plants for Centre.
A few tall plants for the centre, or at the back of a large border, are required, plant a few seeds of the Ricinus (Castor Oil Bean). These may be planted about an inch deep in shallow boxes early indoors in April, and transplanted singly into 3 or 3 1/2-inch flower pots when three or four leaves are started; or one bean may be put in the same sized flower pot mentioned, and the plants allowed to grow there until planted out in June. All of the seedling plants started early as suggested should be transplanted when from four to six leaves have developed into good soil singly into 2 1/2 or 3-inch pots or be set about 1 1/2 inches apart in shallow drained boxes filled with good soil.

Some Annuals Suggested.
A few varieties of annuals such as Aster, Chinese Pink, Phlox Drummondii, Zinnia, Balsama, Marigold, Cosmos, Scabiosa, Calendula (not Marigold), Mignonette, Schizanthus (Butterfly flower) and other varieties if needed, may be sown indoors early in April, and sown out of doors early in May. All of the seedling plants started early as suggested should be transplanted when from four to six leaves have developed into good soil singly into 2 1/2 or 3-inch pots or be set about 1 1/2 inches apart in shallow drained boxes filled with good soil.
