## HELPFUL HINTS FOR MOTORISTS.

**Advice to New Drivers.**  
Many drivers unfamiliar with a car make the mistake of not opening the throttle lever far enough and of advancing the spark too far. They wonder why the engine will not run, and also what causes the back kicking and funny noise when the starter button is depressed.

**Preventing Rust on Fenders.**  
A common cause of fenders rusting at the fastenings is neglect in not washing the under side of the fenders, which are sure to accumulate dirt and mud. A rust preventive or an application of oil will aid in preventing this condition, but the most reliable precaution is to prevent the accumulation of mud.

**Overcoming Engine Knock.**  
Knocking in an engine is most commonly caused by loose bearings, carbon in cylinders, causing pre-ignition and knocking at high spark, opening the throttle too quickly or driving with spark too far advanced.

**Straight Tire on Detachable Rim.**  
It is possible to mount a straight-side tire on a quick detachable or split clincher rim, but the practice is inadvisable, because the clincher rim will cut the side wall of the tire near its head. In other words, the straight-side tire will be run out if used for any length of time on a clincher rim.

**Run Engine by Temperature.**  
To get the greatest efficiency from a motor and at the same time with maximum economy, it should be operated at a temperature point a little below the boiling point of water. This prevents condensation of gasoline, had results from cold oil, and excessive wear to motor parts, not only because of poor lubrication, but also because motor parts have not had the opportunity to expand properly. In other words, hot motor parts fit. And the motor should reach the proper temperature point as quickly as possible.

**Clean Generator Brushes.**  
Examine generator brushes about twice a season. The main troubles brushes are subject to are brushes sticking in holders, holder over-heating, brushes fitted poorly to commutator, weak holder springs or brushes grounded by dirt, oil or carbon particles.

**Turn of Wheel Stops Skidding.**  
When the car begins to skid the only thing the operator can do is to turn the steering wheel in the direction of the skidding, with little or no pressure on the brake. This will correct the skid before the damage is done, provided the speed is not too great.

**What Do Sharks Eat?**  
All sharks are not man-eaters. Far from it; most persons who have fallen victim to sharks have been eaten merely because they happened to be at hand. Then what do sharks eat? Mr. J. C. Bell of the American Museum has answered the question. Mr. Bell examined the contents of the stomachs of more than thirty tiger sharks.
